# INTRODUCTION

#### **Nissior**

The Community Law Centre at the University of the Western Cape, established in 1990, works to realise the democratic values and human rights enshrined in South Africa's Constitution. It is founded on the belief that our constitutional order must promote good governance, socio-economic development and the protection of the rights of vulnerable and disadvantaged groups. Based on high quality research, the Centre engages in policy development, advocacy and educational initiatives, focusing on areas critical to the realisation of human rights and democracy in South Africa

## Focus areas

The Centre's areas of focus are organised in four main projects:

- The Gender Project works towards the achievement of substantive gender equality and the realisation of women's human rights.
- The Children's Rights Project works towards the recognition and protection of children's rights in all spheres of society, with a particular focus on child justice.

  The Socio-Economic Rights Project focuses on the realisation of the socio-economic rights of groups and communi-
- ties living in poverty.
   The Local Government Project assists local government to give effect to its constitutional mandate and promotes accountable and democratic governance and socio-economic development.

The Centre's research staff work in the following areas, in which they have recognised expertise:

- constitutional and international human rights law;
- criminal justice;
- the rights of people living with HIV/AIDS
- · the right to equality and non-discrimination; and
- intergovernmental relations.

## Nature of our work

The Centre's core activities are:

- high quality and cutting-edge research, developing jurisprudence and policy;
- developing policies and legislation for organs of state, such as state departments, provincial and local government, the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) and the South African Law Reform Commission (hereafter the Law Commission); informing public debate on law reform:
- informing public debate on law reform;
- education and training of state officials, civil society and students;
- building capacity in organs of state and civil society through the dissemination of accessible materials and the maintenance of a website;
- assisting in constitutional litigation on key issues; and
- collaborating with international organisations and bodies to further common aims and objectives, and with human rights organisations in Africa to advance the realisation of human rights and democracy on the continent.

#### Staff

The Centre is committed to the well-being and development of all its staff members through continuous learning, information sharing, equitable staff policies and a stimulating working atmosphere.

### Resources

The Centre houses a vibrant Documentation Centre with a specialised collection of material on gender equality and women's rights, as well as on children's rights, socio-economic rights, intergovernmental relations and general human rights issues. The Centre also holds a substantial collection of books dealing with international law and international human rights law. The Centre's user-friendly website is at www.communitylawcentre.org.za.

# Social and political context

The Centre's mission is embedded in, and seeks to respond to, particular socio-economic and political realities in South Africa within a rights framework, including obligations in terms of international standards. From among the many human rights and democracy issues that face the country, the Centre focuses on four main areas: socio-economic rights, gender equality, children's rights and local government. These areas have been selected because we believe that they are important for the transformation of the country and the achievement of social justice.

Socio-economic disparities in the country remain a major challenge for the state and civil society. The jurisprudence on socio-economic rights in South Africa that addresses these disparities is evolving rapidly, as evidenced by the Constitutional Court's *Grootboom* judgment on the right to housing and its *Treatment Action Campaign* judgment on the right of access to health services. However, there are still many barriers to the effective implementation of these rights.

Significant advances have been made towards the realisation of women's rights. However, this recognition has not yet been translated into a consistent improvement in the delivery of services to women experiencing violence. In addition, the prevention and treatment of HIV/AIDS, a concern that disproportionately affects women, remain highly contentious. These two areas of disadvantage are exacerbated by women's continuing economic disempowerment and pose key challenges for research and advocacy.

Children remain vulnerable. Whether through social support or the creation of protective legislation, the state does not provide adequately for them. A systematic means of managing children accused of crimes has been sorely lacking in our country. At present there are no laws to ensure that they enjoy the rights that are afforded to them. Nor are they given the opportunity to make amends for their wrongdoings and to be reintegrated into their communities. The Centre contributed to the development of a holistic approach to child justice, which, if it is implemented, will go a long way towards introducing intersectoral co-operation and a philoso-

phy of restorative justice and towards reducing the number of children in our prisons.

There is a dire need to improve the laws and protection for vulnerable and abused children, particularly children living in poverty, street children and children affected by or infected with HIV/AIDS. State grants are minimal, difficult to access and are not available to all children. Child victims are often brutalised and subject to secondary victimisation due to the contradictory workings of our child protection and criminal laws. At present, a law reform process is underway that could create a proper legislative framework to provide for the care of all children.

The local government elections of December 2000 heralded the final phase of local government transformation. The creation of strong local authorities redefined the old, established patterns of relationships with provincial and national governments. The key challenges of this final phase of transformation are:

- to train and educate councillors and officials at local, provincial and national levels;
- to develop appropriate policies on a range of issues; and
- to establish local government as a fully-fledged sphere of government that can exercise the right to govern, on its own initiative, the local government affairs of its community.

The Centre seeks, through its policy research, education and information dissemination, to make a contribution in meeting the formidable challenges that these social and political realities pose.

# Organisation of the Centre

The Centre's policy is to increase collaboration between its four projects in order to strengthen its capacity as an organisation and to enable it to explore crosscutting themes. Increasingly projects have worked collaboratively. For example, the Socio-Economic Rights and Local Government Projects joined forces in investigating the privatisation of municipal services, in the context of the socio-economic rights obligations of local government.

The Local Government Project and the Socio-economic Rights Projects embarked on a joint investigation into the application of socio-economic rights when basic municipal services are privatised.

The Project focused on the process prescribed by the Municipal Systems Act when a municipal service is outsourced. The research culminated in a seminar in October, entitled 'Privatisation of basic services, democracy and human rights'.

This seminar brought together a range of national and international participants working in the area of the privatisation of basic services.

Its purpose was to provide a forum for:

- sharing international and South African perspectives and experiences on the privatisation of basic services;
- exploring the link between privatisation, human rights and the democratic norms of public participation and access to information;
- exploring the implications of human rights and democratic norms for law and policy reform relating to the privatisation of basic services; and
- identifying areas for further research

## INFORMING PUBLIC DEBATE ON AW REFORM

Through its research the Centre informs public debate on key issues of law reform. It was regularly requested by parliamentary committees and the Law Reform Commission to comment on draft legislation and to address the committees on matters falling within its areas of expertise.

## Children's rights

The Children's Rights Project continues to co-ordinate a civil society campaign, the Child Justice Alliance, to promote informed debate around the Child Justice Bill. To this end, the Project engaged with key individuals and organisations to ensure that there was a strong civil society presence at the public hearings on the Bill. The Project arranged that submissions were made by the National Institute for Crime Prevention and the Rehabilitation of Offenders (NICRO), Lawyers for Human Rights, Resources Aimed at the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (RAPCAN), the Restorative Justice Centre, the Centre for Study of Violence and Reconciliation, the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), SAYStOP, the Western Cape Child Justice Forum and Creative Education with Youth at Risk (CRED).

The Project also serves on the National Children's Bill Task Team. In this regard, it made a number of presentations at a National Children's Bill Workshop in March. The Project has also actively participated in numerous working group meetings and has engaged a number of civil society organisations through workshops on specific aspects of the Children' Bill in the Free State, Northern Cape, Eastern Cape, Gauteng and the Western Cape.

The Project made three written submissions to Parliament's Portfolio Committee on Justice and Constitutional Development on the Child Justice Bill. The first was on behalf of the Project, the second on behalf of the Child Justice Alliance and the third on behalf of SAYStOP. Public hearings on the Child Justice Bill were held in February 2003 and researchers from the Project made three separate oral submissions to the Portfolio Committee on the Bill's content. Following these hearings, the Portfolio Committee requested supplementary information and the Project drafted an additional written sub-

mission furnishing the Committee with arguments in relation to various issues, including state liability, minimum age of criminal capacity and the balancing of victims' and offenders' rights.

After the Sexual Offences Bill was introduced into Parlia-

After the Sexual Offences Bill was introduced into Parliament, both the Project and SAYStOP made written submissions to the Portfolio Committee on Justice and Constitutional Development, followed by oral submissions at the public hearings. SAYStOP made a supplementary written submission on the minimum age of consent, which has been highlighted by the Committee as an important issue for determination.

Following the release of the Children's Bill by the South African Law Reform Commission, the Department of Social Development called for written submissions on the Bill's content. The Project made substantial submissions relating to corporal punishment, local government, parental rights and responsibilities and children's courts.

The Project is a member of the Western Cape Child Justice Forum. This monitoring body comprises provincial Departments of Social Services, Correctional Services, Safety and Security, Education, Justice, Public Works, the Legal Aid Board and other NGOs. The Project has assisted the Forum in making submissions and planning for the establishment of a One Stop Child Justice Centre.

In the area of local government reform, the Local Government Project made submissions to the National Assembly's Portfolio Committee on Provincial and Local Government on the following issues:

### SR Review

The Socio-Economic Rights Project produced four issues of the ESR Review, with a circulation of 3 500 copies. The first issue focused on the implications of the Constitutional Court's jurisprudence on socio-economic rights for the advancement of people's lives. The second focused mainly on children's socio-economic rights, with particular reference to the Children's Bill. The third issue concentrated on the case law relating to socio-economic rights and included articles on HIV/AIDS, discriminatory inheritance laws and their impact on women's access to socio-economic rights, the right to social assistance and the SAHRC Fourth Report on Socio-Economic Rights. The final issue of the year was a special issue focusing mainly on privatisation of basic services and socio-economic rights. Four issues of the electronic newsletter, a proactive measure in promoting usage of the website, were also produced.

## Other publications

The Gender Project, in association with Rape Crisis Cape Town, published a plain-language guide on pre-trial consultation in rape cases. This guide sets out the pre-trial consultation model developed by Rape Crisis Cape Town and also contains detailed notes aimed at enabling rape counsellors to understand the emotional demands that a criminal trial places on rape survivors.

In addition, the Project prepared a second edition of Zikethele, a plain-language publication on the Domestic Vio-

lence Act. In addition to containing a new chapter on health issues (focusing largely on HIV/AIDS), the booklet has now also been translated into Afrikaans, isiZulu and isiXhosa.

# Workshops and training programmes

Apart from the numerous workshops in which the staff participated, the Centre hosted and presented a number of workshops and training programmes across the country.

The Children's Rights Project presented workshops on corporal punishment, parental rights and responsibilities and intercountry adoptions in the Northern Cape, Eastern Cape, Free State and the Western Cape. It held workshops on children's courts in the Western Cape and Gauteng. It presented a two-day workshop on the Child Justice Bill for 37 prosecutors in the Western Cape and hosted a training workshop at UWC on the work of the African Committee on the African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child.

The Local Government Project held training workshops for municipalities and community groups in the Free State, Mpumalanga and the Western Cape on issues such as the terms of reference and delegations. It also facilitated a workshop with the WECLOGA in June on municipal service delivery and service delivery options. In December it hosted a two-day workshop on the implications of the Municipal Finance Management Bill (MFMB) for local government and the possible implementation difficulties municipalities might experience. All stakeholders that will have to assist with the implementation process and provide guidance to municipalities attended this workshop, which laid the foundation for future corroboration.

The Socio-Economic Rights Project hosted and co-hosted a series of seminars and workshops. It held two research and strategy workshops with interest groups to discuss the possibilities of a joint *amici curiae* intervention in the Supreme Court of Appeal in the case of *President of the Republic of South Africa and Others v Modderklip Boerdery (Pty) Ltd (Modderklip)*, dealing with the right to housing. These workshops were held in March and June respectively.

It collaborated with other interest groups in hosting a workshop in August, entitled 'Children without adult care-givers

and access to social assistance'. The workshop brought together key role-players from a range of civil society organisation and the Department of Social Development to explore the barriers children without adult care-givers face in accessing the child support grant and to discuss practical solutions to this problem.

In November the Project hosted a seminar in Cape Town on critical issues in the realisation of the right to food in South Africa, which drew delegates from NGOs, academic institutions and public institutions. With the participation of the UN Food and Agricultural Organisation Legal Officer, Ms Margret Vidar, the seminar also highlighted some of the international developments on this basic right.

Following up on its exploratory research completed in 2002, the **Gender Project** held a provincial workshop on the intersections between gender-based violence and HIV/AIDS in November 2003. The 2002 research consisted of a survey among gender-based violence service providers in the Western Cape to examine their understanding of these intersections. One of the findings was that while all organisations expressed a deep commitment to the integration of gender-based violence and HIV/AIDS, there was a need for guidelines on how to achieve this in practice.

The Project therefore convened the workshop with the original survey participants, as well as a limited number of key resource persons working in other provinces or on national level, to discuss the findings of the 2002 research and to look at

case studies from organisations that have since made progress in the programmatic integration of gender-based violence and HIV/AIDS. The workshop's objective was to identify and develop practical guidelines on such programmatic integration.

The Project has concluded a partnership agreement with the Sarah Baartman Centre for Women and Children in Athlone to develop a legal advice, training and advocacy programme at the Centre. The overall objective is to enhance access to justice for women who experience gender-based violence. Several of the information workshops conducted by the Project, as well as the advocacy work on the Sexual Offences Bill, was done in its capacity as a partner in the Legal Advice and Training Project.

#### Website

The Centre's website not only informs users about what the different projects are doing, but also disseminates their publications. Through this medium, the Centre plays a critical role in educating its cyber users on issues surrounding democracy and human rights in the country.

The Documentation Centre's database has now been put on the website. This enables users to access the growing collection (over 7 000 references) from their own workstations. The database has added to the wealth of information that is already accessible on the website.

## Supporting litigation

Spearheaded by the Socio-Economic Rights Project, the Centre, together with Nkuzi Development Association and the Programme for Land and Agrarian Studies (PLAAS, UWC) were admitted as joint *amici curiae* in the *Modderklip* case in September. The *amici curiae* have been granted the right to lodge written heads of arguments and to present oral arguments at the hearing. The *amicus* submission will centre on the legal principles applicable to a mass eviction situation where it is known that the eviction will result in a community being left literally homeless. This is an important test case on the inter-

relationship between the housing obligations of the State as laid down in *Grootboom*, and the application in a situation of eviction of a disadvantaged group from private land.

The Gender Project, working in association with the Institute of Criminology at UCT, completed an experts' report on South African rape law for inclusion in an *amicus curiae* brief submitted by Interights (an international human rights organisation) in *MC v Bulgaria* (*Application No 39272/98*), a case which served before the European Court of Human Rights during 2003. This matter specifically focused on women's right to personal security and concomitant state duties to investigate and prosecute instances of sexual assault.

# Working with non-governmental organisations

The Children's Rights Project continues to participate in the SAYStOP programme. The Project runs this programme in collaboration with NICRO Western Cape, NICRO Eastern Cape, UCT's Institute for Criminology and RAPCAN. In 2003 a consultative workshop was convened with a number of key NGOs and individuals working in the field of young sex offenders to gather information around prevention programmes.

The Project collaborated with Molo Songololo on the issue of child trafficking and attended meetings to give advice on strategies for lobbying around this issue. It served on the Barrier's Project for the Alliance for Children's Entitlement to Social Security, providing comment and input on a training manual for trainers relating to accessing the various state grants for children. It also assisted UMAC in the presentation of workshops relating to the Provincial Monitoring of the Child Justice Bill. This involved presenting on the content of the Bill in Cape Town, Oudsthoorn and Worcester.

A Project researcher participated in a consultative meeting on the development of minimum standards for diversion, hosted by UMAC and NICRO, and another Project member attended a national meeting of NGOs working on developing an alternative report to the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child.

# International assistance and collaboration

The Children's Rights Project undertook a number of initiatives in Africa. Researchers travelled to Kenya, Uganda, Ghana, Zambia and Nigeria to undertake research for the resource manual on juvenile justice in Africa. While in Zambia a Project researcher presented a workshop on inter-sectoral monitoring of child justice for a group of magistrates, police and prosecutors from three of that country's regions.

In August a Project researcher attended a National Experts Meeting in Abuja, Nigeria to discuss their draft national policy on child justice administration. This meeting was hosted by the National Human Rights Commission, the Constitutional Rights Project, UNICEF and Penal Reform International.
