Transitioning people from learning to earning



- The PYEL is a direct response to the challenge that too many young people are not transitioning from learning to earning.
- The intervention sets out priority actions which together seek to:
 - Stimulate and aggregate demand and
 - Provide a seamless mechanism for young people to be linked to the opportunities generated and
 - Receive support appropriate to their context and pathway.
- The intervention has already begun to increase levels of alignment across government and create space for innovation in ways that accelerate delivery and catalyse further actions.

A network of networks that seeks to:



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CREATE MORE JOBS AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH IN THE FORMAL, INFORMAL AND SOCIAL ECONOMY

The critical function is to stimulate, identify and aggregate jobs and work experiences. This will happen through different approaches e.g. sector based approaches, public employment programmes

DRIVE SYSTEM CHANGE THAT ADDRESS BARRIERS AND SUPPORTS INCLUSIVE HIRING AND REDUCED UNEMPLOYMENT

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Identify and advocate for policy, regulatory, and other changes that will improve the outcomes of the entire system, including changes like reducing data costs, reduce barriers like adapting qualifications requirements to be market-related. LINK YOUTH TO OPPORTUNITIES AND TO SUPPORT – INCLUSIVELY AND FOR FREE

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Connect young people to different platforms in the network where they can to build their profiles, receive nudges to jobs, work experiences and incomegenerating programmes, encouragement, workseeker support, learning, and opportunities (e.g. SA Youth, mapping of services, PES).





A MOA for the National Pathway Management Network signed by the Presidency, DEL, DTIC, DPWI, DHET, DSI, DSBD, DWYPD and the NYDA has established the PMN with government. A coordinating committee is in place to deliver on the objectives

Accomplishments

The following has been achieved since the launch of the national PMN:

- More than 2.35 million young people are registered in the network across the different channels.
- A cumulative total number of 612 996 young people have been placed in opportunities.
- A cumulative total of 144 884 young people to access work seeker counselling.
- Capacity to map services and resources in communities in place through Youth Explorer and launched the mPowa app to enable young people to access services and events in the communities. To date, there have been just under 5000 downloads of the app.
- Pilots are being implemented to explore the ways that the PMN can support TVET Colleges as well as local economic development
- An Innovation Fund of the national Pathway Management Network was launched in October 2021. The fund is supported by the employment stimulus and will support interventions designed to meet the objectives of the national PMN.
