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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Swimming South Africa, one of the leading federations in our country and in FINA has seen one of the most difficult years in the history of swimming and sport in general. The second and third wave of the Corona Virus (Covid19) had such an impact on our activities with our resumption plan only kicking in, in August 2020 with our short course regional competition followed by our national short course championship in Pietermaritzburg. The results of the championships indicates, despite the long layoff our athletes level of fitness were at good levels but had to put the hard yards in training to meet world class standards. The setback of this competition was the positive cases of Covid 19. This resulted in our Covid Compliance Unit stepping up protocols and created bio bubbles around all national events and training camps. The Bio Bubbles and continuous testing has most certainly created a safer competition environment and my gratitude to our Anton Jordaan and the compliance team across the country for ensuring our sport can continue under the strictest of health protocols. Swimming South Africa's continued interaction with the Minister and the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture has most certainly been advantages for our federation. The extra financial support has certainly assisted our federation that faced financial viability. We expressed our gratitude to the ministry for its financial and moral support at a time the world over were facing economic hardship.

The postponed Olympic games has faced a lot of doubt moments but it was the IOC, the LOC and Japanese government who eventually gave a firm undertaking that the games would proceed. The focus was now Swimming South Africa's Nationals and Olympic trial scheduled for Nelson Mandela Metro. Swimming South Africa's executive in line with health protocols regionalize the nationals and held a very successful national championship and allowed all Olympic hopefuls a fair shot at qualifying for the Tokyo

Showpiece. The trails has indicate our potential and hopefuls but we have been behind the rest of the world who generally didn't have such severe lockdowns bar the European countries who resumed in May of 2020. Our biggest shortcoming in preparing for the Olympics is of course exposure to international competition, with FINA cancelling events. Our High Performance Unit in terms of a catch up strategy was now our focus. Accolades must go to the High Performance Unit, their perseverance in driving the race to win philosophy. Creating competitions for qualification opportunities for our athletes has been our focus during these difficult times. On behalf of CANA we hosted the African Camp in addition to our own camps.

The cancellation of local, continental and international swimming events has most certainly contributed and impacted on our ability to prepare for the Tokyo showpiece. This Olympic Games will certainly be the most unequal Olympics Games as far as aquatics is concerned. Not many countries had the severe lockdown we have experience in South Africa and Brazil. The European countries resumed aquatics training and preparation in May 2020 with many other top swimming nations preparing uninterrupted. Nevertheless we are certain our athletes will make our Federation very proud. It should also be noted that our Water Polo team will participate at the games for the first time in more than sixty years. The challenge for Water Polo is to professionalize over the next two to three years to be competitive. Safe to say our depth in all our disciplines are really looking good and must augur well for Paris 2024. The support of all our coaches and working within the national strategy must rate as one of our best achievements outside of our athlete performances. Our federation has seen a number of challenges during the season under review. Financially we were near bankruptcy as the biggest source of our income is derived from member fees and competition income. The pandemic of course played a major role here.

The negative publicity around matters of safeguarding. Here we must pass our gratitude to the Minister of sport and the department who has really supported us financially, with the Lotteries Commission still our main funder. The issue of a corporate sponsor for South Africa's best performing federation still eludes us and I must call for some introspection in this regard,

FINA had its highly successful elections in Qatar with a new leader Husain Al Mussalim taking charge of the International Federation. Our Own Dr Ramsamy was elected First Vice-President and for the first time FINA has a woman in the top leadership and from an African perspective Doreen Tiborcz from Mauritius has been elected onto the FINA Bureau. We have really benefited from our strong relationship with CANA and FINA, our leadership of Zone IV is really paying dividends as the standard of swimming and aquatics are improving at a rapid speed. FINA has made its intention clear on investing in the developing world and Africa in particular. Here we have received FINA's undertaking to support for the High Performance Centre in Franschoek and signing of agreements with key universities in South Africa. We look forward to a very well organized Africa senior and junior championships in Ghana in October of this year. CANA leadership must receive our gratitude in being our biggest support in taking our sport to the next level. I must single our President Ramsay and his vision for our continent. Swimming South Africa despite challenges has seen the biggest registration of swim schools which has received my personal focus as I firmly believe no Learn to swim no elite swimming. This element of our business must continue to receive attention from SSA to build our mass based approach to a sport that is continuously receiving criticism for our slow pace of transformation.

Transforming Swimming is and must become our focus. Here we are seeking a tri-party relationship with the national/provincial ministry, Local Government and Swimming South Africa. We cannot transform without facilities, it is a non-starter without financial support, schools swimming and the organization of schools sport is a key enabler for our transformation strategy. Swimming South Africa has the competence to train, develop and educate swim instructors and coaches to drive our transformation deliverables. Swimming South Africa needs governmental partnerships in

ensuring sustainable transformation and this includes areas like the military, police, basic education, tertiary education and of course the corporate world. Transformation must feed in and align with our competition structures, reporting system so that the visibility of progress can be measured from the ground upwards at district level. Our competition starts very soon with the short course championships and High Performance Planning for all disciplines. The country's vaccine roll-out has been picking up speed over the last few months and some sort of normality should prevail. We have seen the northern hemisphere sporting events are at full capacity and here I must lend my voice and encourage our members to vaccinate. Covid will be with us for some time and the safety and compliance must receive our very best attention.

In conclusion my gratitude goes to our athletes who sacrificed so much during the pandemic, our coaches for rising to the occasion, our affiliates for organizing events and competitions, technical officials for making our events possible, Our compliance teams national and local and our national executive committee for hours and hours committed to our federation under the most difficult of circumstances. The most important stakeholders of our parent community, the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture, Lotteries Commission our national, regional and local sponsors, Local schools where we have implemented academies. The media thank you as you play a major role in promoting aquatics sport in our country. A big thank you to FINA and CANA as our principles for believing in our capability to promote the ideals of FINA and Olympism in South Africa and contribute to the African continent.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

This past year have seen the continuation of worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and on all spheres of society including sport. For Aquatics, this impacted participation on our international participation with most international events cancelled or postponed, with the exception of the Tokyo Olympic Games, which have been scheduled to proceed.

As a result of the revised Alert Level Lockdown regulations, we were able to conduct activities in compliance with health regulations which are detailed in the activity reports.

MASS PARTICIPATION AND EDUCATION

We have had limited activities in our mass participation programme due to the pandemic, though we had activities taking place in Ocean Splash in Western Cape in the Western Cape. We also had activities in Pool Splash and Aquatics Awareness Programmes in North West.

As with other activities Education and Training activities were also affected with a reduced number of training courses taking place, with a substantial shift to workshops being conducted virtually. Measures were also being initiated by the Education department to include training courses on virtual platforms which we hope to introduce in the second half of 2021.

COMPETITIONS & HIGH PERFORMANCE

DOMESTIC COMPETITIONS

Following the introduction of revised lockdown regulations, we were able to host our age group competitions with

revision to comply with health regulations. Some of the adjusted competition included an increased number Level 2 and 3 competitions.

Our National Open Swimming Competitions were adjusted with regional programmes and an invited athletes competing at the single national competitions.

CONTINENTAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

All International Events were cancelled or postponed and the focus was to ensure local competition opportunities for our athletes.

Our second grand prix event included participants from CANA Member countries, which took place following a CANA Camp in February in Stellenbosch.

This event saw some exceptional performance in particular from our female swimmers in preparation for the Tokyo Olympic Games.

GOVERNANCE & ORGANISATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

A major impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has been the adjustment of meeting platforms from physical to virtual, noting that our meetings had to be postponed with the Annual General Meeting taking place virtually in October 2020. In addition regular virtual short meetings have held with provincial presidents to ensure up to date information sharing.

TRANSFORMATION

The feedback from the Eminent Persons Group (EPG) required us to review our targets and review the quality of data received from provinces for submission of our reports to the secretariat. There has been an improvement in our data received from affiliates with our next step to include target setting for provinces.

It is important that all stakeholders collectively work on transformation and we encourage affiliates to engage with their districts and clubs to ensure we give effect to our objectives for transformation.



CONCLUSION

In the 2021 – 2020 year we have been fortunate to receive substantial support from the National Lotteries Commission and in particular additional COVID-19 relief from the Ministry of Sport, Arts and Culture. In addition we received SASCOC and Arena, which have greatly assisted us to sustain our activities.

A special thank you to our general membership, our Affiliate Presidents, Committee Convenors, Staff, SSA Executive Committee and the SSA President whose support have ensured a successful year under difficult circumstances.

i. MASS PARTICIPATION

Not many activities took place as we were still dealing with the pandemic as a country and most provinces were imposing stricter Lockdown regulations by not allowing sport mass participation events even though swimming had been given a participation go-ahead within the prescribed National Swimming COVID-19 Regulations.

Despite the National Lockdown Regulation to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 Virus, we are witnessing drownings every second day nationwide. This is evident that citizens, particularly teenagers, cannot cope with being restricted, as they find a way out to unwind and cool off during the hot days.

We need to ensure that Affiliate and SSA Programmes and activities are aligned to realize our Transformation objectives. We need to meet twice a year with Affiliates for strategic sessions and workshops on paper work that needs to be done in order to fast-track reporting and refunds. We have since been overlooking these two processes.

This season we have seen a decrease in numbers of participants, as the affiliates' main concern was to manage the risks of participants contracting COVID-19, in addition to that mass participation programmes came to a halt due to the national regulations.

A delay in the programmes has posed challenges for the National Federation in handing in reports timeously to executives and funders. This poses a threat for future funding for the federation. We need work together to curb the challenges of unsubstantiated documentation requests, high registration fees and/or gala entry fees, this marginalises community clubs, especially those from previously disadvantaged backgrounds. A strategic succession plan which involves extensive mentoring on how to run programmes is needed. Particularly small affiliates who don't have the capacity or experience running development programmes. As part of our remodelled focus, driven by our strategic focus to build an "active and winning nation", MPP unit also aggressively focuses on supporting the delivery of Talent Identity Development, fostering transformation in our sport and recreation; developing talented athletes by providing them with opportunities to excel in high performance and ultimately achieve success in the international arena. "Swimming from the most rural area to Olympics." Working

together would help swimming grow beyond measures, in particular African communities. (Unity is Strength).

LEARN TO SWIM

The programme focuses on children and adults in previously disadvantaged areas and teaches water safety, water orientation and survival skills in addition to basic stroke development.

Due to a lack of capital once again, the federation was forced to decentralise swimming lessons activities to affiliates. A total of 5 affiliates have successfully implemented the programme. We encourage participation from more affiliates.

The programme suffered a set-back as most pools within Gauteng, Buffalo City and Cape Town municipalities were closed due to COVID-19 Lockdown regulations and some maintenance. This really affected the programme and relationship with different schools that participate.

Recreational galas were held to assess learners' swimming skills who were coming for swimming lessons.

1. NELSPRUIT INTER-SCHOOLS RECREATIONAL GALA

The first time gala for the learners from the four schools with Nelspruit. Learners go for lessons at swimming pools during their physical education/ life skills, to acquire the important life skill of swimming. With the aim to increase membership of transformation clubs and swimmers of colour.

AQUATICS AWARENESS PROGRAMME

A formal communique went out to all affiliates and since then we have received no positive responses. Only one province (North West) took part in the initiative with only two swim schools mainly from Ngaka Modiri molema (Keiko Swemskool) and Rustenburg (Splashyfin).

The programme was well received by participants and their parents as this provided them with an alternative programme for their normal swimming routine, as they were introduced to Fundamentals of Artistic Swimming and Splash Polo.

Due to a limited number of children with COVID-19 swimming permits, participation numbers were narrowed down, albeit more children showed interest in the programme. Indeed the programme has re-ignited swimming for both swim schools. The programme kick started on the 20th March until 28th March 2021.

Over 179 kids graced the events over the period of the 8 days.

The day started with water safety education and this was well received by the parents that were there and most encouraged our team to visit schools with such a programme.



CLUB DEVELOPMENT

The club development programme is geared towards introducing, new club establishment and support/strengthen existing clubs within previously disadvantaged communities for high performance participation. Unfortunately, club programmes were stopped due to The National Lockdown.

Both Paarl and Umlazi club swimmers did very well despite the limited training and preparations for their major championships, as they had managed to improve their quality of swimming and swimming personal best time.



OCEAN SPLASH

On the 1st May Cape Town Metro hosted Ocean Splash at Strandfontein Pavilion, in conjunction with SA Life Saving; Western Cape Dept. of Cultural Affairs & Sport and Western Cape Swimming.

The event was attended by 150 community children from Cape Flats community area, Blue Downs, Khayalitsha, Hanover Park, Bonteheuwel, Delft and West Bank

The focus was to ensure maximum impact of the programme over the holiday period and that children visiting the beach have a safe, fun experience and learn safety aspects & acquiring the vital life skills at the beach as the adults are enjoying themselves both inside and outside water.

POOL SPLASH

Focus was on the municipal swimming pools to create aquatics awareness and talent identification to increase a pool of swimmers to our clubs. A vital life skill was learnt while kids were enjoying themselves at the different pools. Despite the bad rainy weather that lasted a good two weeks during the programme, we had to adjust our programmes for days after the rain. Still communities and holiday makers welcome the programme as they joined in numbers.

Great interest was generated by both children that participated in the activities, and parents who supported their children. Different activities were conducted on a daily basis from water safety, introduction in water for beginners, stroke corrections, splash polo and synchronised swimming were introduced.

COMPETITIONS AND DISCIPLINES

DOMESTIC COMPETITIONS

GRAND PRIX

The SSA Grand Prix consisted of 3 meets, Nelspruit, Stellenbosch and Durban. Swimmers from the senior squad were invited to attend these competitions and selected swimmers received funding to participate.

The first one was held in Nelspruit, in the first week of January, in conjunction with the annual training camp held in Mpumalanga.

The second one was held in Stellenbosch and the third in Durban. These two Competitions were FINA approved, giving swimmers the opportunity to post OG qualifying times.

AGE GROUP

The revised 2020/2021 calendar of events took place adhering to the restrictions imposed by the Covid-19 pandemic. The National events were invitational events and in order to give all swimmers who had achieved QT's the opportunity to participate, regional competitions were held. The number of Level 2 and Level 3 regional competitions was increased so that more swimmers had access to venues, without too much travelling and adhering to the strict ruling regarding numbers allowed at competitions. The no spectator rule had an impact on the age group events, especially on the younger age groups, where parents, unless they were officiating had to drop off their swimmers and wait until they were finished.

2021 S A NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Open Water, 19 - 21 March – These championships were once again held at Marina Martinique, in Jeffery's Bay. There were 263 swimmers from 8 provinces. The championships were trials for the Olympic Qualifier.

Diving – 1 – 6 April, these championships were held in Gauteng, De Jong in Pretoria and St Dominics, East Rand.

Artistic Swimming – The championships took place in Port Elizabeth 23 – 26 April.

Water Polo – 9 – 12 April, the championships were hosted by KZN Water polo at Clifton and Durban Girls High. 10 Male and 10 Female teams participated.

Swimming – 8 – 12 April. The program was held over 6 days, this competition was hosted by NMBA. It was very fortunate that the municipality upgraded some of the equipment that was very necessary and a very successful Olympic Qualifier event was held. Due to the restrictions on the numbers allowed, swimmers were invited to attend based on their FINA points. All the swimmers, coaches, media and visiting officials stayed in the same hotel, creating a pretty safe "bubble" environment.

INTERNATIONAL AND CONTINENTAL COMPETITIONS

All Continental and International competitions, were cancelled or postponed, as international travel was prohibited. At present it is extremely difficult for South Africans to obtain visas to travel.

INTERNATIONAL MEETS

The Aquatic fraternity looks forward to the resumption of International events, especially the Olympic Games.



HIGH PERFORMANCE

This season has been one of the most challenging seasons in the history of swimming in South Africa. The Covid-pandemic arrived at the end of March 2020, causing the postponement of the Olympic Trials, Olympic Games and many other international events to be held in 2020.

The country was placed under a 3-month lockdown where most swimmers did not have access to training facilities. We focused this time on educating coaches in South Africa by giving them workshops by top coaches in South Africa and also the world. We had a great attendance by coaches at these workshops, with more than 300 coaches in attendance, which added great value to the pool of expertise in South Africa.

SA NATIONAL SHORT COURSE CHAMPIONSHIPS

With the easing of the Covid-19 restrictions, we were able to hold Provincial Short Course Competitions at the end of September, which doubled-up as qualifying competitions for SA National Short Course Championships in Pietermaritzburg.

The SA Short Course Championships held at the end of October, proved to be highly successful, after coming off a 4-month lockdown.

Top performer of the competition was Tatjana Schoenmaker – Breaking the SA - and Africa record in the 100m breaststroke, in a time of 1:03, which ranked her 3rd

in the world, with World Champs qualifying times in the 100m and 200m Breaststroke events.

Other stand out performances were:

Rebecca Meder – Achieving a World Champs qualifying time in the 100m and 200m IM;

Kaylene Corbett – Achieving a World Champs qualifying time in the 200m Breaststroke;

Aimee Canny – Achieving a World Champs qualifying time in the 100m IM, setting a new South African record;

Matthew Sates – Dominated the men's events by winning 8 titles, and achieving 3 World Champs qualifying times

Christian Sadie wrapped up the event by setting 5 South African Para records.

GRAND PRIX SERIES 2021

Due to the resurgence of Covid with the second wave in December 2020, we were very limited with preparation competitions for our Olympic potentials to qualify for the Tokyo Olympics.

We managed to hold 3 successful Grand Prix's. The 1st in Nelspruit, held from the 4th to the 9th of January 2021, with a selected National Olympic Relay Squad, consisting of over 20 swimmers and coaches, training and racing the Nelspruit Grand Prix.





The standout performance was Duné Coetzee in the Butterfly and Freestyle events, Rebecca Meder in the IM, Lara van Niekerk excelled in the Breaststroke events and Hannah Robertson was in top form in the Freestyle events.

We also selected a National Black Fast Track Squad where 22 swimmers and coaches were in attendance, under the guidance of National Youth Coach, Keenan Riffle. The swimmers trained hard and raced well.

Standout performances were Kobe Ndbele in the 100m Freestyle and Minkateko Makamu and Tambai Dutiro in the Backstroke events. Tahir Essof excelled in the 200m Freestyle.

Our second Grand Prix / Training camp was held in Stellenbosch from the 13th to the 20th of February 2021. We took our 2 National squads to this camp, hoping for a dramatic increase in performance. We extended an invitation to the CANA countries, and 5 swimmers joined us on the camp.

The Transformation squad included 18 swimmers and was headed by coach Garth Tune. The swimmers trained exceptionally hard at the Maties pool in Stellenbosch and culminated in time trials on the Friday and Saturday sessions.

Outstanding performances went to Alaric Basson, achieving a time in the 100m breaststroke which was just a fraction outside a "B" Olympic qualifying time. On the woman's side, Trinity Hearne won the award for most up

and coming swimmer, after having huge improvements in the 100m butterfly race.

We had the opportunity of fielding 3 or 4 relay teams in each of the Olympic relay events and were extremely happy with the fantastic performances the swimmers put up. We wanted to see how close the teams could come to achieving a time in the 4 wild card slots to gain entry into the Olympic Games.

The highlight was the Women 4 x 200m Freestyle. At that stage we had to achieve a time of 8:07 and they put together an 8:04, which ranked them the second fastest wild card. They have subsequently been eliminated.

Outstanding performance of the competition went to Tatjana Schoenmaker in the 100m breaststroke, where she lowered her best time down to a 1:05.80.

NATIONAL OLYMPIC TRIALS

We concluded a very successful Olympic trials in Port Elizabeth from the 7th to 12th of April 2021.

Highlights of the competition were Tatjana Schoenmaker setting new South African and Continental records in the 50m -, 100m – and 200m breaststroke events. Her best performance was the 200m breaststroke, where she achieved the fastest time in the world since 2017.

Kaylene Corbett also achieved an "A" Olympic time in the 200m breaststroke.



Chad le Clos and Ethan du Preez yet again showed fine performances in the 200m butterfly, where both swimmers achieved “A” Olympic times.

Pieter Coetze, one of our up-and-coming stars, achieved an “A” Olympic time in the 100m backstroke in the lead-off in the medley relay.

Emma Chellius was a fantastic surprise in the 50m freestyle where she achieved an “A” Olympic time and a new South African record in the heats.

On the final night, the 4 x 100m medley relay of Rebecca Meder, Tatjana Schoenmaker, Erin Gallagher and Aimee Canny also achieved a new South African record and a time that should earn them a slot in the Tokyo Olympics.

Our Para-Olympic trials were a huge success and we had the following qualifiers:

- Hendrik van der Merwe (SB5) – 100m breaststroke – 1:45.38


CANA CAMP

SSA were very fortunate to participate in the Continental CANA Camp in Stellenbosch from the 1st to the 8th of May 2021. We had 50 swimmers from the African continent and SSA sent 10 swimmers to add another opportunity for swimmers to achieve “A” Olympic times.

Matthew Sates took full advantage of this competition achieving an “A” Olympic time in the 200m IM and just missing the 100m Butterfly “A” Olympic time.

DURBAN GRAND PRIX

Our final Grand Prix was the Durban Grand Prix, held from the 28th to the 30th of May 2021, in Durban. SSA was able to support the potential Para Olympic swimmers and a small group of Olympic potential swimmers who were just outside Olympic qualifying criteria. Matthew Sates highlighted the competition by swimming an excellent 1:57 in the 200 IM as well as a 51.8 in the 100m Butterfly, giving him his second “A” Olympic qualifying time.



iii. EDUCATION AND TRAINING

A challenging year at all levels and at the same time a year that compelled the federation to experience uncharted territories. The issue of moving online has always been on the table with timelines moved for various reasons because there was nothing compelling. As one/two, affiliates started putting measures in place there was pressure for the federation to step up. Raising above the occasion allowed everyone to grow and develop and led to the upliftment of provinces that were moving at a snail's pace. The spirit of support by sharing zoom licenses and running advertising workshops that were accessible nationally has definitely enabled members to grow and raise the standard of aquatics in the country.

LEARN TO SWIM COURSES

Compared to the previous years, provinces were derailed by COVID-19 and took some time to find alternative and innovative ways of continuing to deliver on their mandate of running courses for their members. The momentum picked up later in the year and provinces found various ways of running courses in spite of the challenges. There were provinces that did not run any courses and with demand on the ground, they will be compelled to find ways to respond to the requests. 27 LTS courses were coordinated nationally compared to 37 from the previous financial year-end.

Todswim was hit hard because provinces have always struggled to run the courses. To say the courses are not in demand is ironic as most swim schools teach babies to swim. Before COVID-19, the federation with two Todswim facilitators was working hard not only to raise the profile of the course but also to reiterate the importance of acquiring the correct certification to teach babies to swim.

The level 1 coaching course had its own challenges, which started in 2020 when CATHSSETA was scheduled to conduct external moderation on the 24 March 2020, and because of COVID-19 the site visit did not take place. In the interim CATHSSETA introduced online registration, which took a few months to be finalised. Eventually when registration opened, it was a struggle to access the system and to meet all the requirements. Assessors and moderators have been provided with the information to register themselves.

UPGRADES

The upgrading system was put in place in 2020 after consultative meetings with the executive and provincial affiliates. There was an outcry to recognise instructors/coaches that have experience, are knowledgeable, and would like to be recognised as senior within their specialty. Instructors in particular did not have levels and there would not be a difference between someone who has been teaching swimming for than 20 years and an instructor that just got accredited. On the other hand, there are instructors/coaches that are not interested in accredited unit standard courses and they are happy to be recognised internally. Most provinces are still putting their systems in place to manage the upgrading process.

OFFICIATING

There has been a decline in the running of official's courses as well, which makes sense as competitions at all levels were also affected by the pandemic. SWIM SCHOOL REGISTRATIONS

The management of swim schools has been a challenge for some time and the pandemic afforded the federation the time to carefully review the accreditation and registration process. The president called out for a much more affordable rate that attracted even those swim schools that were never interested in aligning themselves with the federation. This was also important for the swim schools as they needed to be COVID compliant to be able to operate and as such needed to be registered. The situation yielded good results but also posed challenges, as the federation was not systematically ready to deal with the numbers. Large provinces do not have the work force to verify and monitor the status of the swim schools. The journey continues and there is still a lot that needs to be done in terms of aligning and tracking instructors and swimmers with the registered swim schools. 609 swim schools were registered by the end of the April 2021.

ARTISTIC SWIMMING

It gives me great pleasure to present a report on the activities of South African Artistic Swimming during the 2020/21 season.

COMMITTEES

SSA 2020/21 Technical Committee: Moira Norden (White F), Sue Manners-wood (White F), Shantelle Spogter (Black F), and Azanda (Penny) Dlamini (Black F). Azanda did not register for the season and her position remained open.

The onset of the Corona Virus (Covid-19) resulted in the cancellation of all local and international competitions from March 2020. All swimming pools were closed for the first 6 months. This meant we could hold no physical technical meetings as travel was not permitted, however we stayed in contact via email and WhatsApp. We held one zoom meeting to plan National Age Groups (virtual), SA Nationals and Olympic trials.

TRANSFORMATION

Very little progress was possible due to the closure of facilities. Many disadvantaged athletes did not have access to Wifi, which made Zoom training impossible as well.

At SA Nationals, including SA Youth and SA Junior Nationals, a total of 4 of the 27 entries were from previously disadvantaged groups. There were 8 officials on deck from a total of 28. On an encouraging note the ratio was 6 out of 13 for judges.

SOUTH AFRICAN TEAMS

SA athletes attended no international competitions. The World Series event planned for Egypt in March/April 2020 was cancelled at the last minute.

SCHOOL SPORT PROGRAM

Schools had to stop school sport in 2020. Some schools allowed artistic swimming again from the start of 2021.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT

The following affiliates currently have active clubs with the number of clubs in brackets: WCA (1), ECA (4), CGA (0), NTA (1) and KZNA (1).

It was disappointing that two development clubs (in KZN and CG) ceased to operate in 2020/21.

DOMESTIC COMPETITIONS

SA Artistic Swimming staged the following national events:

1. SA NATIONAL AGE GROUPS:

Virtual – hosted by WCA

We had hoped to stage National Age Groups in Durban in December but had to postpone to January. Even then, we had to cancel. WCA eventually hosted a virtual NAG via Zoom where athletes were judged on videos they submitted. The up side of this was that we welcomed entries from two international clubs. We also were able to use international judges in our panels. Congratulations to WCA on a well organised event.

2. SA LEVEL 1:

Cancelled.

3. SA LEVEL 2:

Cancelled.

4. SA LEVEL 3:

The TASC decided to combine SA Level 3 with SA Nationals in April 2021 in NMB. It was disappointing that there were no entries in the under 12 age group. This is indicative of the restriction Covid-19 has placed on the growth of the sport over the last 18 months.

5. SA INTERMEDIATE NATIONALS:

We held this in April in NMB at the same time as SA Nationals. It comprised two age groups, 3-15 years (Youth), and 15-18 years (Junior).

6. SA NATIONALS:

SA Nationals (Senior, Junior and Youth) took place from 23 April to 26 April in NMB.

SA has received a continental qualifier for the entry of a duet in the 2021 Olympic Games. Trials for this took place at Nationals. Selection also took place for the FINA Juniors (cancelled in 2020) and FINA Youth Championships. Both these events were scheduled to run concurrently in August in Canada but have now been postponed again.

Once more we used international judges to assist in the judging. This time, immediately after the event, we sent these judges videos taken at the competition. They judged technical elements for technical routines and difficulty in free routines, and submitted scores on google forms. Interestingly FINA is currently considering introducing a new scoring system where a panel will assess difficulty from a video submitted prior to the actual swim.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

Our local athletes competed in several virtual competitions. Selection for one virtual FINA event was done from results of a local virtual competition we held. Results from all these competitions were forwarded to SSA. Our athletes achieved some excellent scores and top placings.

A positive development from the onset of Covid-19 is the use of the Zoom platform to host competitions. This has meant we can compete against other countries without the cost of travel. It is not ideal but certainly useful in assessing our progress.

CANA

The cancellation of the Egyptian World Series leg meant that once again there was no artistic swimming competition with CANA countries.

SA SQUADS

The High Performance Centre initiated the announcement of SA training squads for Artistic Swimming in 2020. The SSA technical committee appointed Sue Manners Wood as coach with Moira Norden and Jenny Naidoo forming the rest of the management committee. The selectors announced two squads on the basis of National Age Groups 2019 results and other competitions held in 2019. The junior squad was aged up to 15 years and the senior squad had athletes aged 15 and older. The management committee decided to set up weekly zoom training sessions with the squads. These zoom sessions ran every Monday for 90 minutes. The first one was on 7 September 2020 and the final one in March 2021. The sessions were well attended by all squad members. The athletes enjoyed many sessions with invited international coaches. Sue Manners-Wood supervised the training sessions. We appreciate all the hours of hard work she spent on planning and hosting. The squads proved a good innovation and kept the athletes fit and motivated. Many thanks to the SSA support staff, especially Dean and Anton for their help, in getting us started.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

The registration process for artistic swimming coaches now follows that of swimming coaches, and coaches are required to obtain CPD points in order to register.

FINA Online Learning introduced an opportunity for many virtual learning sessions. A course for beginner coaches, run on this platform in October 2020, attracted 24 SA coaches and swimmers. SSA also ran some interesting courses for local aquatics coaches, and artistic swimming assisted with presentations on shared aspects such as streamlining, buoyancy, treading and sculling.

We are waiting for the rollout of the Artistic Swimming Learner Guide. Sue Manners-Wood co-ordinated this project with assistance from Eileen Xhakaza at SSA, Moira Norden and Emma Manners-Wood. This is the first important step to ensuring that all our coaches are correctly qualified.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATION

Louise Blignaut is our SSA executive member. Louise remains actively involved in all the activities and attended SA Nationals.

The Super Swimmer TV crew attended SA Nationals for one day.

CONCLUSION

Thanks to all those who have supported artistic swimming over the past season – swimmers, parents, officials and administrators.

In particular my sincere thanks go to the SSA technical committee, our FINA rep and the hardworking staff at SSA for their patience and help.



DIVING

This report has been compiled without direct information from the affiliates. As the Convenor of South African Diving, I am able to compile an overview of the season, but the information that relates to the affiliates is from my observation, alone.

TRANSFORMATION

DIVER DEMOGRAPHICS

Demographic transformation continues at school level, both at primary and high schools, mostly in the Johannesburg area in the private girls schools. A few public girls schools participate in the high school league, but there are not many, and a few girls from co-ed primary public schools participate in the primary school league. As can be seen from Appendix A (fixtures), both the primary and high school events run a thriving league. Please see Appendix B for the results of the Interprimary event held in November 2019 and Appendix C for the results of the Interhigh event held in March 2020. Subsequently, due to the Covid-19 pandemic no primary school event was held in November 2020, nor was the Interhigh event in March 2021 held. The names of black divers have been highlighted for ease of reference. In the weekly interschool leagues, which precede these two events there are more black divers participating, as the numbers are obviously bigger at this level. The South African National Schools Championship for Diving was run in October 2019, and again the number of black divers at this event is increasing, and more importantly, black divers are still achieving places on merit – please see Appendix C for results; black

divers highlighted. No Schools Championships were held in 2020 due to the pandemic.

The numbers of black divers participating at club and provincial level are lower, as this relates to the fact that the number of white divers is correspondingly lower, as the required rate of commitment at those levels is always concomitantly higher. As can be seen from the SA National Age Group event and SA National results, the number of black divers participating has increased, here too, and, again, are achieving places on merit.

Currently there is no provision for disabled diving.

COMMITTEE COMPOSITION

The Technical Diving Committee consisted of Ms Loredana Raccanello (Central Gauteng) as Convenor, Mrs Kim Boustred (Kwazulu Natal) and Mr Trevor Keswa (Kwazulu Natal) as members. Mrs Justine Heydra (Central Gauteng) was co-opted onto the committee as National Competitions Secretary in 2018, and Mrs Jane Davenport was appointed by SSA as another member in April 2019. Mr Stefan Steenkamp has been appointed as the Athletes' Representative.

The Selection Committee was made up of Ms Dominique Philippopoulos (Central Gauteng) as Convenor, Mrs Linda Liebenberg (Northern Tigers) and Mr Robert Costa (Western Cape).

As of 2021, the diving technical committees still visibly active in the affiliates and sending divers to national events

are Central Gauteng and Northern Tigers. KwaZulu Natal Diving is facing challenges due to the unavailability of the Kings Park Pool Complex and a reduction in funding from government since the COVID-19 pandemic. This has resulted in insufficient funds to pay for transportation of the divers and remuneration of coaches..

Free State Province was also hard hit by the pandemic and the implementation of lockdown regulations. Luzanne Swanepoel's attempt to start a Diving club has since been met with several obstacles. Western Cape has not registered their diving club yet, although they are making headway with a few divers and we look forward to seeing them compete at national level soon. Thus, the visibly working TDC's are Central Gauteng Aquatics and Northern Tigers Swimming. KwaZulu Natal Aquatics and Western Cape Aquatics will hopefully pick up momentum once the pandemic eases, and possibly Free State will too.

2020/2021 SEASON

The 2020/2021 season ran very well, with all stakeholders working hard to make it a success, despite the Covid-19 pandemic. The positive from the pandemic was that being forced into using Zoom meant that the meetings required to set the new selection criteria (2021 – 2024) could take place more often and the Technical Committee was able to have more in-depth discussions. The objectives of the season were:

- To continue to improve communication between all members of the Technical Committee and between the members of the Selection Committee, and then between the two committees and to make the decisions taken as transparent as possible.
- To continue to improve and expedite communication between the diving community and SSA.
- To continue to encourage all members of the diving community to work towards a common goal.
- To continue to ensure that all events were run professionally with a minimum of unprofessional behaviour on the part of judges and technical officials.

- Selection of teams to various international events.
- Set a Selection Policy for 2021 – 2024 that everyone believed was for the betterment of SA Diving and would encourage support of divers in their endeavours to compete at the highest level.

We continue to achieve our objectives as set out and have begun to make progress on showing transparency on decisions, so that all stakeholders feel there is no subterfuge. The diving community has come to understand and agree on what is required to compete at international events. This has allowed the Technical Committee to lower the degree of difficulty slightly and use a minimum score to achieve eligibility for selection.

SCHOOL SPORT PROGRAMME

There is both primary and high interschool competition in schools in Johannesburg, Bloemfontein, Port Elizabeth, East London, Pietermaritzburg, Durban and Cape Town. One Pretoria high school, and individual children from various primary schools, join the Johannesburg schools to compete. The high schools compete in the January to March term and the primary schools in the September to December term. Those provinces that have coaches who run clubs are then able to take the divers from school level to club and provincial level. Some of the high schools are part of a “National Aquatics Festival”, but not all, which is held in the 2nd or 3rd week of February each year. The high schools in Johannesburg compete in an Interhigh event in March, where 9-10 schools are involved. The primary schools in Johannesburg run an interschool event every year in November comprising of 8-9 schools.

Last season - 2020, the SA Schools National Diving Championship did not take place due to the Covid-19 pandemic. We are hoping to be able to run it this year if the pandemic allows.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Central Gauteng now carries 4 clubs, as the one club combined with another – Falcons out of St. Andrew’s School joined Crusaders. Another club, which was also going to start out of Kingsmead College also joined with Crusaders. In KwaZulu Natal the Kings Park Diving Club continues to run, although at a very slow pace, currently, due to the issues mentioned above. Northern Tigers and Western Cape still run one club each, although Cape Town Diving Club did not register for the 2020/2021 season.

The remainder of the provinces do not have clubs due to a shortage of coaches, although, as mentioned previously in this report, Free State are attempting to resurrect diving, so there is a chance that a club will be registered in Bloemfontein in the future.

DOMESTIC COMPETITIONS

Despite the pandemic, by adhering closely to all Covid protocols, we were able to successfully run the following events.

1. RSA CUP AND NATIONAL AGE GROUP

The above event was run in December 2020 by Central Gauteng Aquatics: Diving. The event was very successful, and all the Covid-19 protocols were observed to keep everyone safe. There were two infections reported which occurred elsewhere and were reported to the SA Covid Officer. The issues were managed under his direction. The two sections used at NAG were renamed Elite and Novice and again, there were several divers competing in each age group.

2. SOUTH AFRICAN NATIONALS

The South African Youth Games and Senior National Championships were held at St. Dominic’s School in Boksburg. The venue is ideal as it allows for both the individual and team springboard events to take place, however, it has no platform facilities, so the platform events were held at the De Jong Centre in Pretoria.

Attending the event, besides all the Central Gauteng divers, were eight divers from Northern Tigers. However, due to the training issues in KZN, there were no divers from KwaZulu Natal, selected to dive in the Youth Games and Senior Nationals. Again, there were no divers from Western Cape. Thus, there were insufficient men competing to make the men’s events competitive. Overall, Central Gauteng won the Women’s Shield. Northern Tigers Swimming won the Men’s Shield and the Overall Trophy. Full results are given in the appendices attached to this report.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

Junior divers were conditionally selected at NAG 2020 for the competitions in Dresden. Due to the pandemic, these events were cancelled. Junior divers, have however, been selected for World Juniors, which is due to take place in December in Kiev, Ukraine.

Again, due to the pandemic, few of the overseas divers were in a position to travel to South Africa for the National Championships. This meant that the divers who had qualified to attend the World Cup were selected on their results at SA Nationals and Africa Cup 2019. Julia Vincent and Micaela Bouter were able to compete at the World Cup and earn another place to the Olympics; effectively, South Africa now has two places. Unfortunately, due to the complications of the pandemic, at this point (June 2021) we are still waiting to hear whether that second place will be allocated to the federation. If it is, we will have two divers eligible for the Olympics – definitely a first for SA Diving!

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

JUDGES

Mrs Fiorella Barberini continued in her role of National Judges Convenor this past season. She ensures that judges are “kept on the straight and narrow” by revisiting rules during pre- and post-event meetings, by reminding judges of specific rules. The videoing of events, as mentioned elsewhere in this report, although useful, is still not something we can use due to lack of skilled manpower.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMMES

Mrs Kim Boustred in Kwazulu Natal continues to run a volunteer programme. In Johannesburg, those coaches who are linked to a school that also offers Water Polo began a “piggy-back” effort with Water Polo’s Learn-to-Swim programme, by offering Learn-to-Dive lessons

at those schools. This was working extremely well, but when the pandemic hit, everything shut down. As it is a very worthwhile effort, we will endeavour to resume implementing it as soon as it is possible to do so.

SCIENTIFIC SUPPORT AND TALENT IDENTIFICATION

There is no structured scientific support; coaches access what they can on an individual basis. Talent identification is done ad hoc by teachers who are involved in the sport at some level, referring divers to clubs. Thereafter, club coaches work with the divers within clubs.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATION

SA Diving is able to reach the public via television broadcasts, mostly, on Supersport. The events focused on were RSA CUP, NAG and SA Nationals.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, although much has been addressed within diving in order to uplift and develop diving in this country, there is much that still needs to be done. I hope to continue working towards making diving more popular and more successful.

OPEN WATER SWIMMING

The Covid 19 pandemic had a major impact on the discipline of open water swimming during 2020, with the numerous measures undertaken by National Governments to curtail the impact of the virus on society worldwide.

The initial National “Lockdown” in mid March 2020 changed the dynamic of sport domestically and by July 2020 when stringent control measures were introduced, The Federation was well placed to resume activities under the guidance of the appointed SSA Covid 19 Officer, Mr. Anton Jordaan.

This allowed the discipline to continue to make headway abet under stringent guidelines.

EDUCATION & TRAINING

The Covid 19 pandemic provided unique opportunities to conduct education and training in a remote manner via multimedia platforms such as Zoom and Microsoft Teams etc.

The entire swimming fraternity embraced these platforms positively with administrators, instructors and coaches able to attend a vast array of online presentations, both domestically and internationally.

To this end a number of South African relevant open water swimming presentations have been created and presented with good attendance and well received by participants.

With the Federation currently revamping their Coaching Level programs, it is imperative that open water swimming modules be included into the respective programs so to ensure that individuals have a sound knowledge of the discipline as they progress along their chosen pathway.

With the onset of the forthcoming open water swimming season, four modules will be available. They are:

- Getting Started in Open Water Swimming
- Structuring your Open Water Swimming workouts
- Open Water Swimming Training
- SSA Open Water Swimming Technical Officials (4 modules – 90 minutes)

Cooperation between the Swimming South Africa Education and Training team, High Performance Management and the discipline management has been positive and certainly lends itself to ensuring that professional and informative modules will be available to Federation members in the foreseeable future.

SSA APPROVED OPEN WATER SWIMMING EVENTS

The Covid 19 pandemic severely restricted the number of events hosted during the 2020-2021 domestic open water season.

Swimming South Africa requested that all open water swimming events that request SSA Approved Open Water Swimming Event status should be submitted to the Federation by the end of July 2020 for inclusion onto the



SSA Approved Open Water Swimming Event Approved calendar, which was published during August 2020, so that Coaches and athletes could plan the periodization of their training programs accordingly.

The response from most Affiliates and Event Organizers was positive, with a comprehensive, but limited SSA Approved Open Water Swimming Event Calendar being published well before the onset of the South African summer open water swimming season. These were the approved dates. Generally paperwork submission was in line with stipulated SSA Executive approved and published protocol.

Maverick event organizers continued to disrupt the process.

2021 SOUTH AFRICAN NATIONAL OPEN WATER SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Eastern Cape Aquatics (NMBA) open water swimming fraternity presented a professional Covid 19 compliant 2021 South African Open Water Swimming Championships from 19th – 20th March 2021.

HIGH PERFORMANCE – DOMESTIC

The Swimming South Africa National Open Water Swimming Squad was “revamped” to come into line with the Swimming South Africa National Swimming Squad program.

While the system mirrored each respective discipline, due to Covid 19 travel restrictions the country was divided into FOUR groups with respective management personal nominated to conduct activities as prescribed within their region.

A number of local camps were held, with common programs and relevant education and training provided via Zoom presentations to those who attended.

The annual Swimming South Africa National Camp in the Mpumalanga Lowveld was poorly attended by open water swimming athletes with concerns over the Covid 19 pandemic and the efficiency of the mooted “bio-bubble”.

The popular Grand Prix Open Water Swimming events were not hosted due to low water levels at the preferred venue in White River.

The structure of the Swimming South Africa National Open Water Swimming Squads needs to be revisited and rationalized before the onset of the 2021 – 2022 Season. A plan of action has been formulated and circulated to the High Performance Manager for consideration.

HIGH PERFORMANCE – INTERNATIONAL

Due to travel restrictions imposed to curtail the spread of Covid 19 no international camps / tours / competitions were undertaken.

CONCLUSION

Under trying circumstances due to the Covid 19 pandemic the 2020 – 2021 open water swimming season can be regarded in a positive light.

Disruptive and toxic elements must be eliminated from the environment so as to ensure that the positive trajectory that has been achieved in the past five years is maintained.

WATER POLO

The 2020 /2021, Water Polo season was similarly to the other codes severely impacted by the Covid 19 pandemic. This is evidenced by the fact that the last international game played by senior players was the 2019 FINA World Championships in South Korea and the FINA Junior Men at Kuwait in December 2019. Our CANA Zone 4 2021 tournament realistically may not take place. It did not materialize in the traditional period of February to March.

Whilst Water Polo, is not defined by the number of international games, our domestic program was also impacted in that, the SSA Senior Water Polo Tournament was cancelled due to the Covid 19 second wave, but thereafter resurrected at short notice and held in Durban in April 2020. Our flagship school annual tournament due to be held in December 2020 was also cancelled

On the international front, SASCOC relaxed its Olympic criteria and both the Men and Ladies Teams were entered and participated at the Olympic Games 2020 held in Tokyo, Japan. Recently the SA Junior men's team was selected to participate at the 2021 FINA Junior Water Polo Tournament currently being held in the Czech Republic (August 2021).

The Olympic preparations commenced with National camps held in December 2020 and concluded with the team announced in June 2021. Whilst the team was as fit as could be, they certainly lacked game time. European based international players played in their domestic leagues and played in international tournaments. Most other Olympic teams had warm up-tournaments and went into the Olympics with an average of thirty international

games. As South Africa, we could only have the SA Olympic squad members playing amongst themselves.

The end scores in every match at Olympics reflected this lack of high-level competition although the SA Teams showed their competitiveness against the Japanese men and Australian women in the final game.





Huge thanks must go out to the TC Members, players, parents and well-wishers who got behind the Olympic squad to raise funds for the Olympic preparations, which was self-funded. The money raised, was shared amongst squad members as a subsidy towards their total preparation costs expended.

Further thanks must go to SASACOC for their professionalism in managing Team SA.

That said, our transformation in respect of black player participation at international events is under scrutiny and not satisfactory. Whilst there are black players introduced to water polo at the under 14-age group, the players reduced as they reach their grade 11 year at school and disappear at University level.

Having identified that the vast majority of water polo players stop playing after high school it should be a water polo imperative to retain the players at University.

The Water Polo TC should set a University League as an imperative for the next cycle. It is anticipated the next 2024 Paris Olympic Team, will be drawn from University players. Steps are already underway to support that Water Polo is consistently included in the codes participating at the World Student Games.

Thanks must also go out to the Director of Coaching and TC Members who in trying circumstances had to at short notice, re-organize national training camps. The added Covid compliance for all SSA national training camps was also a new reality that everyone had to learn. Such experience will stand water polo in good stead knowing that we have to plan with the uncertainty.

Finally, further thanks to the executive and staff of SSA for the role that you play in assisting and elevating water polo.

President North West Swimming

North West Aquatics was blessed with a highly successful 2020/2021 swimming season. Although our numbers are down by 31% and the NW Junior series has not been able to run for this season, the importance of gala's was pointed out. Not just physical importance but even more for the mental importance. The focus of Water Safety and Swimming is a focus point that NW Swimming will grow in the next four years. The focus of an active but enjoyable Sport must still be our main outcome.

1. PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS

1.1 THE AGE GROUP GALAS

During the season, three Age Group galas were held with great success.

The following Championships galas were held:

NWS Short Course Championship in October 2020 at Peaconwood College. North West University Swimming club was the winner. Well done!

NWS Long Course Championship in December 2020 at Potchefstroom Dam Swimming Pool. North West University Swimming club was the winner. Well done!

1.2 DEVELOPMENT GALAS

No development Galas could be held due to COVID regulations and the availability of Swimming Pools.

1.3 LTS

Several LTS instructors attended several courses throughout the season. NWS will continue to arrange LTS courses throughout the 2021/2022 season.

We have 20 additional Swimming Schools that have registered and we welcome them to our organisation.

1.4 OFFICIALS' COURSES

During the past season, a concerted effort was made to train officials on all levels and in all districts in the province. Training and certification of timekeepers and judges in all clubs, certification of senior provincial officials were some of my priorities. I also aimed at taking steps to ensure that the officiating experience at all galas would be positive, that officials' organization at galas be improved, and that training on the pool deck would be a continuous effort.

It remains a challenge to ensure that officiating duties be allocated fairly and that all clubs take ownership of their responsibilities in this regard.

In aiming to reach these goals, the following steps were implemented during the season:

1. A calculator (formula) is used to determine the number of officials required from each club for each gala, depending on the number of swimmers entered by the club.

2. All officials on the pool deck must be trained before they are allocated a specific duty.
3. All newly qualified officials are placed with experienced officials who are asked to assist with practical support.
4. All officials on the pool deck must wear the official card that identifies them as officials and where sessions worked are recorded.
5. An administrative referee is used to ensure that the gala referee has adequate administrative support during every provincial gala.

The following training sessions were conducted:

At present, NWS has an impressive number of qualified officials on all levels. 1.5 EDUCATION AND TRAINING

This portfolio evolved over the years into a major swimming component that will require some serious thoughts on how to be managed in the future. The cost and time involved to get all paperwork in order is a major concern.

During the season coaches attended all North West Academy Squad camps where coaches interacted. At the clinics presented for the NW Academy, Squad coaches were also allowed to give inputs on the way they see the future of NW swimming.

Very successful webinars were also hosted and the response was more than expected.

1.6 HOLIDAY PROGRAM

For the 2020/2021 season, the December Holiday program was not done. The focus was moved to the LTS schools to start the Development of Swim Schools. This project will continue to roll out during the next 4 years. The past year we did roll out our Water safety week and also our Water awareness week. A massive thanks to Nthando Mkandla, Megan Hautmann and Alex Steyn.

1.7 NWS ACADEMY SQUAD

Our squad was reduced to 30. The number of swimmers stepping up to the next level is increasing on an annual basis. A big thank you to Mr. Mickey Olivier the Academy Squad Coach/ manager.

The NWS Federation would like to thank Mr. Tinus Vermaak and Maurice Robertson from the High Performance and Academy Centre. Due to the motivation from the Institute and the use of their equipment, there has been an increase in the number of swimmers qualifying for SA Junior Nationals.

Our squad attended several training camps and testing days throughout the season.

On behalf of all the squad members, we would like to extend our grateful appreciation to the managers that oversee the squad.

1.8 INTER-PROVINCIAL GALAS

1.9 OPEN-WATER SWIMMING

At the SA OPEN WATER NATIONALS at Marina Martinique 19 – 21 March, 2021 5 swimmers competing. All swimmers finished all their events and swam within their qualifying times. Quite a few PB's were achieved as well. NWS achieved 1 podium position:

NWS was once again invited to be part of sanctioned Events held in the province namely The Sun City Mile at Sun City Rustenburg and the Platinum Mile at Buffelspoort.

1.10 NATIONAL COMPETITIONS

North West Swimming was able to host SSA Level 1 & Level 3 National events. Level 1 was hosted at Rustenburg High School 25 meter swimming Pool and Level 3 was hosted at Sasolburg Penny Heyns Pool. We also had swimmers participated at Level 2 that was hosted by Northern Cape Swimming in Kimberley. North West SAJN, Youth Nationals, and National swimmers were allowed to swim in either Gauteng or Port Elisabeth.

The swimmers at all SSA Level gala performed brilliantly and we are grateful for the opportunity to still swim during the current COVID Pandemic.

The Executive Committee of the NWS Association is committed to ensuring that once these clubs are functional, these clubs became fully-fledged members.

2. TRANSFORMATION AND GROWTH

The Executive Committee and NWS Clubs continued working on establishing possible swimming clubs in the previously disadvantaged areas. But with funding and availability of venues and infrastructure, this will remain a huge problem to overcome. We as the North West Executive will continue to get the role players in the Provincial Government to assist.

Over and above the development galas, several LTS courses and water safety presentations were held throughout the North West Province, including a number in rural areas where often, no facilities are available. The newly Transformation portfolio in North West has already made use of proposals and awareness. The rollout of the Bojanala District as the first phase has already started.

Taking into consideration our vast rural area of jurisdiction, in the province, these requested courses remain a challenge.

3. MARKETING

The North West Facebook page has been developed and is fully functional. The Website is also being updated to give more information to any swimming queries. The current Webpage is being revised as the platform is not 100% user-friendly in the current state. The webpage will be revised and become more user-friendly to clients.

The focus will also be to attract Swim Schools in the province as a marketing tool for them and created a platform where parents will be able to get valuable information.

4. FINANCES

The Financial Statements were Audited by M. Schutte & J Van Jaarsveld Chartered Accountants and Auditors and did not reveal any deficiencies in the ICFR (Internal Control over Financial Reporting).

NWS still implements the financial control plan that was used over the last four years which has reaped success. The Executive Committee is very conscious of the financial burden aquatics requires and considers the growth of the sport when planning.

Education expenses which include LTS, officials, and coach's development had an increase of 42% over 2019-12 due to the addition of new enhancements to education programs.

Capital investment in the form of new starting blocks, lane ropes, and repair of our Touchpads took place in the 2019/2020 season. Although we still do not get any assistance in the form of any LOTTO Grants we as North West Swimming will keep on doing our best to provide an environment where swimmers of all ages and capabilities will be given to opportunity to succeed in their dreams.

5. EXECUTIVE

There is a huge workload increase in getting sport more formalized and organized in the country and the province.

The Committee will continue to meet every 4 weeks to ensure the success and future of swimming within the North West Province.

6. CONCLUSION

One of the major challenges in implementing the fees' structure while we are in the country's current financial situation is the lack of Olympic Standard size swimming pools and facilities, highlighted in meetings with the Provincial Government.

Currently, no 50-meter pools are being utilized for official galas in North West. Potchefstroom Dam 50meter Municipal Pool was closed as a COVID restriction area and the Pool is not being made available for swimming in any form. North West Swimming has the availability of 25meter pools. The Rustenburg Marais 50meter Swimming Pool has closed and the North West Swim Executive is in constant communication to try and assist. It must be noted it is with much frustration as the willingness to meet and assist is not always present from top officials at the Rustenburg Municipality.

The North West Executive will continue to interact and help resolve problems, where we are able, to get the Marais Swimming Pool open.

The Jouberton Municipal Pool, despite direct assistance from the Matlosana Municipality, was found not suitable for use in 2018, and to date, the communication to assist to help recover the pool has had no positive results.

North West Swimming is experiencing great difficulty in finding lines of communication, with the relevant officials at the Municipal and District levels. The requests, which we receive, at short notice from various institutions, for water safety presentations and/or LTS courses, remain a challenge. Coupled with these requests is the lack of any basic facilities.

The North West Swimming Association covers a vast area over which we must travel to attend galas and meetings. This makes administration and attendance extremely difficult and costly. All Sporting codes had to adapt to major changes during the last season. All codes form part of the North West Sporting Association that is now operational.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

A special word of thanks to all the swimmers that registered and competed in all the provincial and national events throughout the season, not only within the province but all over the country.

The parents, grandparents, guardians, and all the people that brought the swimmers to the organized events and accompanying them to all events.

To each Club that hosted a specific gala and worked to ensure that the pools were in top condition.

The Executive Committee worked tirelessly throughout the year to ensure the professional and efficient running of all our galas.

EASTERN CAPE AQUATICS

As you all know this has been a very different season with many highlights and a few lowlights, but first I must say a very big thank you to my committee and some of the boards. Without your assistance this season would have not been such a success. I am not going to single out anyone as that is a dangerous scenario, but you all know who you are.

As a quick overview, we started the season right in the middle of Covid-19 and the whole way that we perceive a gala changed. It also affected the income of the clubs, districts, and the province. As the season progressed some galas were postponed or cancelled. We had to swim galas under restrictions of no spectators and restricted number of swimmers and officials in the pool area. NMBA took a while to get the use of Newton Park pool and made a good effort to run as many galas as possible. BCA however were reduced to one 25-meter indoor pool and had to make do with that. Just after galas started, they were stopped due to the second wave of Covid then started yet again.

Early in 2021 I was asked if we were prepared to host the National Olympic Trials as well as all the level galas in the Eastern Cape and surrounds (some swimmers came from areas outside of the Eastern Cape). Unfortunately, due to the Joan Harrison pool not opening, ALL these galas had to go to NMBA. We now end the season heading into the third wave of Covid. Meeting via WhatsApp messages and via Virtual meetings became the order of the day.

We had our AGM via Zoom and all went well. There were no changes to the members except for one departure – Bongani. There were also a few reshuffles, but it was business as usual. Education and Training took on a new discipline that had never been in swimming - Compliance. At this point I would like to congratulate all the compliance officers. We were very fortunate in that I am only aware of one or two people who had Covid at a gala but there were no infections. Thanks to everyone who complied with the Compliance Officers. I did hear of complaints, but my reply is get used to the new normal.

I would also like to thank Stephen Haswell who stepped down as President to have a less stressful time on ECA only to get landed with the Administrator position. Thank you, Stephen, for your hard work in guiding the ship. Another big thank you goes to Michael Canter. As

mentioned above I was asked if ECA were prepared to host the Olympic Trials in the NMBA District. Michael and his LOC did an incredible effort, and everything went very well. There was lots of work in the background that went unnoticed but is appreciated. After discussions with the districts, it was decided to split the other levels between BCA and NMBA. Lionel Poovan did a lot of work behind the scenes to try and get the municipality to open the Joan Harrison but was only successful at the end of the season. As a result, we had to dump all the galas onto Michael and NMBA. We were also forced to drop the Level 1 gala in all districts. NMBA virtually ran galas over a few weeks with only a day or two to reset up. I had very favourable comments from SSA and provinces. Prior to the start there were many negative comments but after the first day the praises started to come in and by mid-way, I was told that Newton Park was a great pool and a fast pool. If rumours are true, then more big events will come to NMBA including more Senior Nationals.

Congratulations to Margaret on getting OR Tambo Aquatics further along. Margaret has got new LTS teachers and officials and has a strong committee. The registrations were due to come in this year but were disrupted by Covid. All going well the registrations will come in this year.

The registration went well, and we had no real issues with Batch at SSA - thank you Janet. We still have a large problem in that we are trying to run a province on a shoestring budget and at the same time do an outreach. No other province has as many areas where there are no swimming clubs and facilities. The area is also vast, and we are expected to reach all areas. Hopefully, Chris Hani Aquatics will be up and running this year. Their only problem is getting people to stand on the committee.

Artistic Swimming - congratulations of your performance. Water Polo I am very pleased to see that we have potential Olympic players under consideration for the team. It is also good to see that the players are getting registered.

The finances are not very healthy but better than last season. It has been and still is our intention to spend what we bring in on development and our swimmers.

MY SAFETY IN WATER

A collaborative project between Aquatics Gauteng, Gauteng Department of Education and Gauteng Department of Sport, Arts, Culture and Recreation.

REPORT OF PROJECT – MAY & JUNE 2021

For the reporting period, only phase one of the project (To Listen and Learn) could be implemented. Under the State of Disaster and with a pandemic in our Country, it is sometimes difficult to execute a project as is planned. It was thus necessary to make changes to the project plan on very short notices.

SCHOOL VISITS

Due to the rotation of learners, the Aquatics Gauteng Team had to visit each school twice to ensure that all the learners in Grade 1 and Grade 2 of those specific schools were reached.

POSITIVES

- The Aquatics Gauteng Team members were well received at all schools.
- The Departmental officials made sure that schools are informed of the visits.
- The learners were excited to be part of the project.

CHALLENGES

- The Aquatics Gauteng Team members arrived at schools and were then informed that the school is closed due to a COVID outbreak.
- Incorrect learner numbers were provided – thus resulted in incorrect number of learning materials delivered.
- Communication can be improved.

OUTSTANDING MATTERS

- Due to the change in school calendar, visits to 11 schools are postponed to the next quarter.

OUTCOMES

A total of 42 schools were visited and a total of 7 765 learners were reached. If this is compared to the number of learners that Aquatics Gauteng envisaged to reach, 7 500, the project can be deemed to be a success for this semester. Adding this number of learners to the number of learners reached during Nov/Dec 2020, a total of 2 821 learners were reached during phase 1.

THE WAY FORWARD

PARTNERSHIP WITH SWIM SCHOOLS

The current reality is that there is almost no municipal pool available to roll out phase 2 (To be safe in water) and then phase 3 (To learn to swim). This due to low maintenance or vandalism during lockdown. There are also a limited number of heated pools available in Gauteng.

To be pro-active, Aquatics Gauteng has approached all the registered swim schools and their owners to establish how many of them are willing to assist with phase 2 (To be safe in water) and then phase 3 (To learn to swim). All swim schools have their own facilities. In the next semester Aquatics Gauteng will pair primary schools with swim schools that are in proximity of that school. In doing this, the project can progress to the next phase and progress can be made with the certification process envisaged by the Gauteng Department of Education.

This does not mean that there will be no implementation of phase 2 or phase 3 of the project at any municipal pool. The moment that a municipal pool is ready, the programme will be extended to those pools.

DEVELOPMENT OF A MOBILE APPLICATION (APP)

Aquatics Gauteng together with an IT specialist are in the process of developing a mobile application (APP) to track learners who are in our programmes or who are part of this project. This will make it easier to do certification and will make it easier for the Gauteng Department of Education to track learners who have completed phase 2 (To be safe in water) and then phase 3 (To learn to swim) of the project.

SYNOPSIS OF THE PROJECT

PHASE 1 – TO LISTEN AND LEARN!

CONCEPT

A 30-minute lesson presented to learners in a class, using a poster as guideline. Each learner receives a workbook and a pack of crayons to enhance learning through practical participation.

PROGRAMME

Gauteng Department of Education identify schools and the Team visit these schools from Mondays to Thursdays.

Lessons started at 09h00 and all attempts are made not to continue past 12h00.

The Team of Instructors are divided in groups of two Instructors each. Each of these teams visited one school per day. With the rotation of classes during the reporting period, it was necessary for Instructors to visit the same school twice.

PHASE 2 – TO BE SAFE IN WATER!

OBJECTIVES

Water Safety (adaptation) is designed specifically to establish, through a combination of support, teaching and methodology, a step-by-step approach for the learner to bring them gradually to a level at which they positively embrace an unfamiliar medium water. This approach should be basic, allowing the learner to enjoy being in the water with the security provided by the instructor and swimming aids, and with a gradual escalation of activities in terms of difficulty.

The learner will be considered to have this stage successfully completed when:

- The learner shows no fear when getting into and on contact with the water.
- The learner can float dorsal and ventral positions.
- The learner can move about with no technique in both positions and can change positions without the aid of the instructor.
- The learner can move about totally submerged (underwater action)
- The learner can inhale through mouth out of water and exhale through mouth and nose in the water.
- The learner can enter and exit water safely.
- The learner is aware of safe rescue methods.

CERTIFICATION

Once the learner has achieved all the required outcomes, a certificate of compliance will be issued, and the learner will receive a pencil case as gift.

PHASE 3 – TO LEARN TO SWIM!

OBJECTIVES

Once the learner is adapted to water and deemed to be safe in the water, the learner will be taught the different swimming styles. These are freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke, and butterfly. The main aim is that the learner masters each style and be able to apply the rules as is prescribed by FINA.

CERTIFICATION

Once the learner has mastered all the swimming styles, a certificate of compliance will be issued, and the learner will receive a swim cap as gift.

WESTERN CAPE AQUATICS

It gives me great pleasure to present my 2nd report as the President of Western Cape Aquatics following an Inaugural Annual General Meeting (AGM) on the 4th August 2019. The report highlight key achievements over the period, and I'm excited about the talent and achievement of our athletes over this season. The season followed a very challenging period with COVID 19 impacting our sport and community in general. The pandemic forced us to think innovate and out of the box to keep the sport active but also to grow it at different levels. Building capacity at district level, to become self-sustainable, must still be high priority for the new season. Our registered membership increased significantly from 4,528 in 2019/20 to 6,136 in the 2020/21 season. The increase due to COVID 19 regulation that stipulates that all athletes must be registered to participate in any sport activity. The increase represent the sports potential and its real impact across the province and different communities and must be consolidated as way forward.

WCA also performed well under high performance with an increase of 42 athletes selected for different national

age groups teams. In the year of review 2020/21 a total of 140 athletes represented the province at national teams locally and internationally. The year was still affected by COVID 19, but we were able to host 860 events across the different aquatic disciplines. A total of 1174 athletes participated at national competition representing a 30% increase from the previous season. Hopefully this will serve as good foundation for the new season if we allowed, given the pandemic still very active within our country and province.

Lastly I want to thank our board members for the support and hard work the season. Without team work this task will be impossible. All the best and hope we will be able to continue to play an active role in advancing and developing the sport across the province.




MEMBERSHIP



HOSTING OF EVENTS & GALA'S




PERFORMANCE

HIGH PERFORMANCE

The high performance program focus on identifying talent and mainstreaming them into programs to compete on higher level than the normal structure. These athletes represented the province at different national and international platforms for different age groups from under 16 up to senior squad members. For the period in review WCA achieved increase of 98 athletes in 2019/20 to 140 in the 2020/21 season. The women representation increase exponentially with an increase of 36%. Representation from the previous disadvantaged group still limited and require specific focus.



DEVELOPMENT & TRANSFORMATION

TRANSFORMATION

Transformation in sport became important not only to ensure that the sport reflects the demographic profile of the country, but also to promote inclusivity. WCA is committed to transformation and views the opportunity to grow the sport by focussing on developing a schools competition and talent identification program. For the period in review we had 578 PDI athletes. The number increased from 482 to 578 in the previous season. The majority of athletes located in the Cape Metro area representing 90% of the athletes. The province in collaboration with districts must focus on talent identification drive and implement development programs specifically in township areas. Significant focus must also be on developing the sport in smaller districts such as Eden, West Coast, Karoo and Overberg.



PDI SCHOOLS PARTICIPATION

The foundation of developing the sport must be on expanding the footprint to previously disadvantaged schools and identifying talented young people to participate at all levels of competition. With limited school structures in place only 12 township schools participated in aquatics for the 2020/21 season. The availability of facilities will be critical to develop the sport specifically in the township areas. Application for development funding must be prioritized for the new season.

MPUMALANGA PROVINCE SWIMMING

1. INTRODUCTION

Welcome to everyone who made the time to attend the Mpumalanga Province Swimming (MPS) AGM.

Annually we reflect on a season gone by, which always seems to have been more challenging, more hectic than the previous. Nothing prepared us for Covid-19, with its devastating impact on sport, athletes, coaches, clubs and people in general. Covid-19 is clearly also going to be with us for the quite a while.

With reference to Covid-19 and its devastating impact on sport specifically, I want to make use of this opportunity to commend all our members - coaches, clubs, LTS instructors, sponsors, parents and most importantly our swimmers. Everyone struggled, went beyond the point of frustration and desperation, but persevered. Unlike most sport codes, swimming and especially MPS knuckled down and took all the challenges brought upon us by Covid-19 in our stride.

We can take pride in the way we all addressed the unique Covid-19 challenges. We had our disagreements, we had our anxious and desperate moments – but we never gave up and we continued to find ways to move forward and get back into swimming.

While other sport codes were still thinking of excuses and prohibiting their members from all forms of participation, swimming was already hosting events. Again, we made a plan and we pushed forward in the best interest of our swimmers. Galas took on a unique format, participants were restricted, spectators were banned from events, health protocols were put in place, permits were issued and we got swimming going.

On behalf of MPS, it is also appropriate to make use of this opportunity to specifically thank Mr. Anton Jordaan (National Covid-19 Compliance Officer) and our own Peter Obermeyer (MPS Covid-19 Compliance Officer). They worked tirelessly for months issuing permits, issuing event compliance certificates, and ensuring proper implementation of health & safety protocols.

Needless to say, the past season was completely disrupted as a result of Covid-19 and most development projects, training programs and schools swimming had to be cancelled or put on hold. On the positive side, Covid-19 forced everyone into the digital era and to think out of the

box. Online meeting platforms not only ensured executive and other meetings continued without interruption, but made participation in governance much easier. MPS also made use of the opportunity to develop its online officials training material (E-learning) to ensure officials training becomes accessible and convenient for all members. Well done to Ronel Bekker, Chrisna Cloete and Calvin Xaba for their assistance in development of our online officials training platform.

The Mpumalanga Department of Culture, Sport & Recreation fully funded our recent LTS and SSA Coaches Level 1 training course for 30 new candidates. After successful negotiations with SAA, we were also able to recently launch our new grass root swimmer development program. Initial funding has been secured to cover the expenses of six (6) of our LTS Instructors for 12 months. We trust the grass root development program will greatly assist with transformation and the development of new swimmers to a level where they can join swim clubs and competitive swimming.

Despite the Covid-19 impact, swimmer registration numbers were somehow maintained at an acceptable level. We sadly witnessed the permanent closing down of the oldest swimming club in Mpumalanga – FINS Swimming Club. Norma Kumm has been a highly respected swimming coach, who also mentored various other coaches over the years. Barberton Marines, one of our newest swimming clubs, also had to close-down and we trust club swimming will soon return to Barberton.

As a result of Covid-19 restrictions, various new LTS clubs/schools emerged in desperate need of permits to continue operating and we trust most of these LTS clubs/schools will now become permanent members of MPS and SSA. MPS affiliation of LTS clubs/schools will open the development pathway for many young swimmers, who are annually lost to the sport due to not being part of the federation.

Open Water Swimming continued to show steady growth despite the fact that we were only able to host one (1) open water event in Mpumalanga during the past season due to Covid-19. Our swimmers still performed exceptionally well at the SA National Open Water Swimming Championships and we trust open water will continue to grow next season. Discussions are underway to introduce Water Polo in due course for the first time since the establishment of MPS.

2. CHALLENGES

In reflecting on the past season, it is imperative that we acknowledge some of the challenges swimming is facing in Mpumalanga, without further mention of Covid-19:

- Schools Swimming. For some reason Mpumalanga schools still don't support government's development objectives for schools swimming and in some instances refuse to make school swimming pools available for MPS swimmer development programs, which severely restricts transformation in swimming.
- Marketing & Sponsorship. Funding in sport is critical for development, growth, and sustainability. Due to the continued lack of financial support from government for sport, the need for corporate sponsorships becomes extremely critical every year.
- Development & Participation. We need to further encourage our swimmers to participate and encourage new swimmers to take the next step to organized swimming. We need to actively increase membership, especially in respect of transformation targets.
- Facilities. Will always be a challenge in Mpumalanga with the extremely limited number of facilities available and poor maintenance of especially our municipal facilities. We need to ensure each available facility has a swimming program.
- LTS Membership. Attracting and accommodating the number of "unofficial" LTS Schools to ensure integration of all swimming activities under MPS. Large volumes of potential swimmers are lost annually due to their non-involvement in organized swimming.
- Transformation. Swimming in general is receiving a lot of negative political attention due to the lack of black representation – at all levels. It is imperative that everyone accepts the challenge and actively supports transformation, or we could soon find ourselves completely excluded from government support.

3. REFLECTION ON PAST SEASON

The past season has been another very successful season for MP Swimming, despite all the restrictions. Some highlights and concerns include the following:

- Expected decrease in membership registrations, especially school swimmer registrations due to Covid-19.

- Most number of qualifiers ever for SSA Junior Nationals, SA Senior Nationals and SA National Open Water Championships, with 57 swimmers qualifying in total.
- Most ever participants at SA National Open Water Championships (18 swimmers), including 3 individual medalists.
- Since we had to compete in the strongest swimming province during our SSA regional and national events, an expected lower medal tally was achieved compared to the previous seasons, totaling 38 medals.
 - SSA Regional Level 2: 14 medals
 - SSA Regional Level 3: 7 medals
 - SSA Junior Nationals: 7 medals
 - SSA Snr. Nationals: 7 medals
 - SSA Open Water: 3 medals
 - Masters: No event
- SA Schools Championships were cancelled due to Covid-19, but 3 MPS swimmers have been invited to participate in a national school trials event this weekend. Swimmers were selected from the 2019 SA Schools Championships results. A South African Schools Swimming Team comprising of 3 age groups and totaling 24 swimmers will be selected to represent South Africa at the International Schools Sports Federation Summer Games in Jinjiang, China later this year. Well done to Bennet Groenewald, Brooklyn Croxon and Matthew Andrews. 3 Additional MPS school swimmers were also identified, but excluded from the trials due to them not having any official time on the SSA database for the 2020/2021 season.
- Despite the number restriction inside sport venues and related Covid-19 restrictions, MPS still hosted a very successful and well attended annual Mpumalanga Open Swimming Championships.
- MPS successfully developed and launched its online officials training platform during the past season and 156 technical officials completed the timekeeping, judging, starter or referee course online with an overall pass rate of 91.6%.
- MPS hosted one (1) LTS training course and one (1) SSA Coaches Level 1 training course attended by 30 new candidates. No CPD workshops were held due to Covid-19 restrictions. MPS however did communicate online CPD workshops presented to its coaches.

- George Thabete, one of our coaches, was invited by SSA to the recent CANA high performance training camp and gala in Stellenbosch, where he received valuable coaching mentorship under some of South Africa and Africa's top swimming coaches.
- Due to Covid-19 restrictions MPS was not able to host the annual SSA Level 1 Championships.
- Three (3) swimmers from Mpumalanga were included in the 2020 SSA National Swimming Squads, based on the overall performance at end of season SSA events. Congratulations to Brooklyn Croxon, Matunda Banza & Tamara Froneman.
- Three (3) of our swimmers were also selected to represent South African Age Group Team last year at the CANA Zone 4 Swimming Championships in Botswana. Since we didn't have an AGM last year, we wish to make use of this opportunity to congratulate Emma Beyers, Mathunda Banza and Leson Visagie. Coach George Thabete was also selected as an Assistant Coach for the team.

4. GALAS

MPS managed to host most of its annual Age Group galas, including a very successful Mpumalanga Open Championships despite strict Covid-19 regulations. The annual Mpumalanga Sprint Gala, Mpumalanga Winter Championships, Top Schools, SSA Level 1 and schools leagues could unfortunately not take place due to the Covid-19 restrictions.

Galas were hosted under very strict Covid-19 health protocols, which included a restriction on people entering venues. Spectators remained prohibited, which created a unique and somber competition environment. Galas were split into smaller age group sessions, which actually received a lot of positive feedback from parents. A special word of appreciation to all our technical officials who had to work much longer hours due to less officials permitted and more swimming sessions.

As we have shown during the Covid-19 impact, MPS will continue moving forward and taking decisions in the best interest of our swimmers.

SSA LEVEL GALAS, JUNIOR NATIONALS & SENIOR NATIONALS

Due to the Covid-19 restrictions, MPS requested assistance from Aquatics Gauteng to allow our swimmers the opportunity to join their regional and regionalized national competitions in an attempt to at least create one decent competition opportunity for our swimmers. Again, we wish to express our sincere gratitude towards Mr. Anton Jordaan and Mrs. Magdeleen Fair for their assistance and support in accommodating our swimmers.

S.A. OPEN WATER CHAMPIONSHIPS

Well done to the SSA High Performance Committee and the Nelson Mandela Bay Aquatics LOC for organizing at least one national competition under fairly normal conditions. The Jeffreys Bay Open Water event was again a huge success with 18 swimmers from Mpumalanga participating. As mentioned, despite a severely restricted season, our swimmers managed to swim 27 PB's from their 28 individual events – including 3 medalists. MPS officials also assisted the LOC and did duty as Chief Referees and/or Assistant Referees in 8 of the 9 events, while also providing other technical officials during the course of the event.

Well done to the entire Open Water squad and management team.

S.A. MASTERS SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Mpumalanga Masters was cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

SMALL PROVINCE INTER PROVINCIAL

All Inter-provincial events were cancelled due to the Covid-10 pandemic.

MAPUTO SPRINT GALA

Maputo Sprint Gala was cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

SA SCHOOLS SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS

As with all schools sport, all national competitions were cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

5. WAY FORWARD & CONCLUSION

After such an extremely unique and challenging season, it is only appropriate to properly acknowledge all the efforts behind the scenes from all the executive members and the continued support MPS has received from SSA. The current MPS Executive Committee has shown tremendous commitment during the past four (4) seasons in serving the swimming fraternity and their willingness to remain available for the next Olympic Cycle is a reflection on their commitment towards the entire Mpumalanga swimming fraternity. I therefore appreciate the personal time all the executive members invested in swimming during a very hectic past season.

Being on an executive always look lucrative until you start, and you soon realize that you must put in hours of your free time, which you could have spent doing something else or focusing on family. One soon realizes that after putting all the hours and constant critics and many phone calls that it is not always nice to serve your community, but someone must do it and in the end we do it for our children and the love of it.

STRUCTURE

We currently have 3 districts, namely Mangaung District, Fezile Dabi District and Letjweleputswa District.

SCHOOLS AQUATICS

There were no Schools competitions for 2021. The stats from 2020 competitions below just for interest:

- Inter - Primary Schools: 18-19 February 2020, Bloemfontein. A total of 453 learners participated – 250 Girls and 203 Boys from 19 primary schools participated.
- Inter - High Schools: 20- 21 February 2020, Bloemfontein. A total of 211 learners participated – 123 girls and 78 boys from High Schools in the Southern Free State.
- Development Competition: 22 February 2020 at Stadium Swimming Pool, Bloemfontein. This gala catered for up-and-coming swimmers and swimmers in the previously disadvantaged areas. 73 Swimmers took part in the Development gala.

FINANCES

The detailed financial report from the treasurer and auditors will indicate where we stand now.

COMPETITIONS

Free State Aquatics with the assistance of Mangaung Aquatics organized the provincial competitions. Level 1, 2 and 3.

SAJN – 91 swimmers

Senior Nationals – 14 swimmers

Olympic Trials – 4 swimmers from Free State were invited to partake in the Olympic Trials.

Some swimmers however manage to participate in the Senior National Open Water Championship at Marina Martinique early in March 2021. This was also an Olympic trials meeting and all the qualified swimmers can testify that they have competed well. The swimmers again achieved good results.

Congratulations must go to all our swimmers who:

- Were selected or identified by SSA to represent South Africa at international competitions,
- Each swimmer that was elected to represent Free State or South Africa for any of the competitions.

Special congratulations, to all the swimmers that qualified for the different levels and national competitions and achieved their personal best times. This means that you have developed and grew as a swimmer. It is an honor and a privilege to be selected for any team and comes with dedication and hard work. We are grateful for the talent that was bestowed upon these athletes and would like to thank the coaches for the great results. It is through the dedication, long hours of planning and professional conduct of the coaches that our swimmers grow and develop as human beings. Coaches play a vital role in the upbringing of swimmers, our children. Free State Aquatics are blessed and fortunate to be able to say that we have some of the best coaches in the country. The results mentioned is proof that this province can produce top athletes. Our coaches with the minimum resources always produce competitive athletes.

We thank all the officials that have served swimming during this past season on and off pool deck. During the very trying times of Covid our officials bravely kept going. We keep on saying that without the officials there cannot be any galas. Thank you and well done to all the officials who did duty at SAJN and Senior Nationals. Our administrators, executive committee of our members (districts and clubs) once again you did a brilliant job to keep the swimming going, it is a thankless job where

we sometimes feel that we do not get enough gratitude for. During a very dangerous pandemic, you continued to manage swimming in the district. Club committee members received a lot of praise but was also sometimes got criticized forgetting that they are volunteers that put up their hands to support the sport and clubs. Well done to all the club presidents. Our biggest and most asset is the athletes, and they need to come 1st with every decision we make, and we want to thank them because without their hard work and discipline in perfecting their craft there would be no sport. Parents as usual supported the athletes and the federation well. Under difficult circumstances parents kept the swimmers together.

Transport is a huge challenge for our kids from rural areas to get to a swimming pool. Parents need to get more involved.

Sponsorships are needed and this we have to organize ourselves.

More pools need to be built so that communities can have access to facilities.

We need to improve our talent ID process at school level.

Facilities tend to be a major problem. Polokwane Municipal Pool is in need for renovation and upgrade. We have to negotiate with the municipality to address this.

Heated pool facilities continue to be a challenge during the winter months for training and for competitive swimming.

LTS instructors not committed to stay with the province. This continues to impact the transformation programme. We train them and then they move to Gauteng.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Involvement of Swimming South Africa and local Government advising schools of the importance of water safety and the Portable Pool Project.
- Involve Government so that pool facilities in both urban and rural areas are maintained.
- Free or reduced costs when hiring pool facilities for development.
- The Association covers a vast area over which we have to travel, in order to attend galas and meetings. This makes administration and attendance extremely difficult and costly.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S RESPONSIBILITY & APPROVAL

The Executive Committee are required by the association's constitution, to maintain adequate accounting records and are responsible for the content and integrity of the annual financial statements and related financial information included in this report. It is their responsibility to ensure that the annual financial statements fairly present the state of affairs of the association as at the end of the financial year and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended, in conformity with its accounting policies. The external auditors are engaged to express an independent opinion on the annual financial statements.

The annual financial statements are prepared in accordance with our accounting policies and are based upon appropriate accounting policies consistently applied and supported by reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates.

The Executive Committee acknowledge that they are ultimately responsible for the system of internal financial controls established by the association and place considerable importance on maintaining a strong control environment. To enable the Executive Committee to meet these responsibilities, the Management Committee sets out standards for internal control aimed at reducing the risk of error or loss in a cost - effective manner.

The standards include the proper delegation of responsibilities within a clearly defined framework, effective accounting procedures and adequate segregation of duties to ensure an acceptable level of risk. These controls are monitored throughout the association and employees are required to maintain the highest ethical standards in ensuring the association's business is conducted in a manner that in all reasonable circumstances is above reproach. The focus of risk management in the association

is on identifying, assessing, managing and monitoring all known forms of risk across the association. While operating risk cannot be fully eliminated, the association endeavours to minimise it by ensuring that appropriate infrastructure, controls, systems and ethical behaviour are applied and managed within predetermined procedures and constraints.

The Executive Committee are of the opinion, based on the information and explanations given by management, that the system of internal controls provides reasonable assurance that the financial records may be relied on for the presentation of the annual financial statements. However, any system of internal financial control can provide only reasonable, and not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Executive Committee have reviewed the association's cash flow forecast for the year to 30th April 2022 and, in the light of this review and the current financial position, they are satisfied that the association has or has access to adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

Although the Executive Committee is primarily responsible for the financial affairs of the association, it is supported by the association's external auditors.

The external auditors are responsible for independently auditing and reporting on the association's annual financial statements. The annual financial statements have been examined by the association's external auditors and their report is presented on pages 50 to 51.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

UNQUALIFIED OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of Swimming South Africa set out on pages 71 to 84, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2021, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in reserves and statement of cash flows for the financial year then ended, and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements fairly present, in all material respects, the financial position of Swimming South Africa as at 30 April 2021, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with its accounting policies.

BASIS FOR UNQUALIFIED OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the Independent Regulatory Board for Auditors Code of Professional Conduct for Registered Auditors (IRBA Code), together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of financial statements in South Africa. We have fulfilled our other ethical requirements in accordance with these requirements and the IRBA Code. The IRBA Code is consistent with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (Part A and B). We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

OTHER INFORMATION

The management board is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Supplementary schedules set out on pages 66 to 67. The other information does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

EMPHASIS OF MATTER

We draw attention to the matter below. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

As is explained in note 17 to the financial statements, the association needs ongoing donor support if it is to continue operations. These financial statements have been prepared on the basis of accounting practices applicable to a going concern which assumes that the association will generate sufficient funds by way of grants from donors to continue funding its activities in the ensuing year. Accordingly they do not include any adjustments, relating to the recoverability and classification of assets or to the amounts and classification of liabilities, that would be necessary if the association were unable to continue as a going concern.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT AND THOSE CHARGED WITH GOVERNANCE FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with their accounting policies and the requirements of the Constitution, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible

for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Association's financial reporting process.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or

conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the association to express an opinion on the financial statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the association audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit. We have communicated with those charged with governance on all relationships and other matters, which may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence and, where applicable, related safeguards.

GENERAL OVERVIEW

The principal activity of the association is to develop, control and promote all aquatic disciplines in the Republic of South Africa.

The association is a non-profit sport organisation. The association has been approved as a public benefit organisation in terms of Section 10 of the Income Tax Act and the receipts and accruals are exempt from Income Tax under Section 10(1) (cN) of the Income Tax Act.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The association has adopted the principles in the King IV on corporate governance as it applies to non-profit organisations.

This was done in the previous year and is retained in the year under review.

RESULTS

The results for the year are fully disclosed in the attached annual financial statements.

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The Covid-19 pandemic lockdown which has negatively affected some activities during the past financial year, has continued after the financial year end. This is likely to affect the activities of the federation into the new financial year because of the lack of swimming training and competitions. However Swimming SA was granted permission on the 26 June 2020 from the Minister of Sport, Arts and Culture to resume swimming training and competition subject to stringent health protocols. Although the effect of the pandemic lockdown has had a material impact on the financial situation, we are confident, following strategies that have been implemented, that the federation will survive the future effects of this lockdown into the foreseeable future.

POST FINANCIAL POSITION EVENTS

No material fact or circumstance has occurred in the affairs of the association between the statement of financial position date and the date of this report.

EQUIPMENT

During the year under review, the association acquired equipment costing R194,095 (2020: R291,255).

AUDITORS

During the year under review, Douglas & Velcich were retained as auditors.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. The annual financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis, except for financial instruments as indicated below. The financial statements incorporate the following principal accounting policies which are consistent, in all material respects with those applied in the previous year

1.1 SIGNIFICANT JUDGEMENTS

In preparing the annual financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts represented in the annual financial statements and related disclosures. Use of available information and the application of judgement is inherent in the formation of estimates. Actual results in the future could differ from these estimates estimates which may be material to the annual financial statements.

1.2 TANGIBLE ASSETS

The cost of an item of tangible assets is recognised as an asset when:

- it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association; and
- the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

Costs include costs incurred initially to acquire or construct an item of tangible assets and costs incurred subsequently to add to, replace part of, or service it. If a replacement cost is recognised in the carrying amount of an item of tangible assets, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

Tangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible assets other than freehold land, to write down the cost, less residual value, by equal instalments over their useful lives as follows:

The depreciation charge for each period is recognised in surplus or deficit unless it is included in the carrying amount of another asset.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of equipment is included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognised. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition of an item of equipment is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item.

It is the policy of the association to write any asset purchases off against the operating fund in the year that the assets are acquired as the majority of the income is from funders who request that the assets be expensed in the year of purchase.

1.3 EQUIPMENT FUND

An equipment fund is maintained to separate from accumulated funds the funding of non-current assets, which are not available for the short term funding of operations.

The fund is maintained at a value equal to the carrying value of equipment in the statement of financial position. Depreciation and profits or losses on disposal are charged against operating income each year and adjusted against the fund.

1.4 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

MEASUREMENT

Financial instruments carried on the statement of financial position include bank balances, accounts receivable and accounts payable. Financial instruments are initially measured at cost as at trade date, which includes transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, the following instruments are measured as set out below :-

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable are stated at cost less provision for impairment losses.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk in change in value.

Cash and cash equivalents are measured at fair value.

Foreign currency petty cash is revalued at the spot rate for each foreign currency denominated balance at the year end. The revaluation exchange differences are accounted for through profit or loss.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

Accounts payable which are short - term obligation, are stated at their nominal value.

1.5 IMPAIRMENT

The carrying amounts of assets are reviewed at financial position date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If there is such indication, the assets are written down to the estimated recoverable amounts. The recoverable amount is the higher of the net selling price and the value in use.

1.6 INVENTORIES

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.7 LEASES AS LESSEE

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

Finance leases are recognised as assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position at amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, the present value on the minimum lease payments.

The discount rate used in calculating the present value of the minimum lease payment is the effective interest rate.

Any initial direct costs are added to the amount recognised as an asset.

The lease payments are apportioned between the finance charge and reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance charge is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate of on the remaining balance of the liability.

Any contingent rents are expenses in the period they are incurred.

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1.8 PROVISIONS AND CONTINGENCIES

Provisions are recognised when:

- the association has a present obligation as a result of a past event;
- it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; and
- a reliable estimate can be made of the obligation.

The amount of a provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation.

Where some or all of the expenditure required to settle a provision is expected to be reimbursed by another party, the reimbursement shall be recognised when, and only when, it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received if the entity settles the obligation. The reimbursement shall be treated as a separate asset. The amount recognised for the reimbursement shall not exceed the amount of the provision.

Provisions shall not be recognised for future operating losses.

If an entity has a contract that is onerous, the present obligation under the contract shall be recognised and measured as a provision.

After their initial recognition, contingent liabilities recognised in business combinations that are recognised separately are subsequently measured at the higher of:

- the amount that would be recognised as a provision; and
- the amount initially recognised less cumulative amortisation.

Contingent assets and contingent liabilities are not recognised.

1.9 REVENUE RECOGNITION

Income from fees, grants and sponsorship is brought to account in the financial period to which it relates.

All other income is brought to account as and when received.

1.10 INTEREST INCOME

Interest is brought to account as and when received.

1.11 EXPENDITURE

Expenditure is accounted for on the accrual basis of accounting.

1.12 PROJECT ACCOUNTING AND EXPENSE ALLOCATION

In terms of its contractual obligations to donors, the association's policy is to allocate project expenses that are clearly identifiable as such, directly against project funds.

Indirect and shared costs are apportioned on the basis of management estimates.

Accrued and deferred grant income is based on the balance of the project fund after taking into account the direct, indirect and shared costs as described above. The unexpended surplus of the project fund is deferred to the following year or the deficit is accrued in the year under review.

1.13 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

SHORT-TERM EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

The cost of short - term employee benefits, (those payable within 12 months after the service is rendered, such as paid vacation leave and sick leave, bonuses, and medical aid contributions), are recognised in the period in which the service is rendered and are not discounted.

The expected cost of compensated absences is recognised as an expense as the employee renders service that increases their entitlement or, in the case of non-accumulating absences, when the absence occurs.

The expected cost of bonus payments is recognised as an expense when there is a legal or constructive obligation to make such payments as a result of past performance.

2. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

FINANCIAL RISK FACTORS

The association's activities could expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including fair value interest rate risk), credit risk, liquidity risk and cash flow interest rate risk. The association's overall risk management programme focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the association's financial performance.

Risk management is carried out by the executive committee, who evaluate financial risks.

(A) MARKET RISK

The association has no significant exposure to foreign currency risk.

(B) CREDIT RISK

The association's credit risk is attributable to accounts receivable, accrued income and liquid funds.

The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counter party is a bank with credit rating assigned by international credit - rating agencies. The association has no significant concentration of credit risk, as accounts receivable is subject to rigorous credit control.

(C) LIQUIDITY RISK

The association manages liquidity risk by monitoring forecast cash flows and ensuring that adequate cash reserves are maintained to cover anticipated expenditure.

(D) CASH FLOW AND FAIR VALUE INTEREST RATE RISK

The association has minimal exposure to interest rate risk as surplus funds are invested in local interest - bearing accounts.
